Chairman, Dennis Jarecke, called the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m. with the following members present-Dennis Jarecke, Andrew Ditter, Robert Voichoskie, Ralph Horacek, Tim Cornwell, James Carlson and Robert Small. Also present is County Clerk, Danette Zarek. Chairman advised those present of the open meetings act and its posting in the Supervisor's Room.

Notice of the meeting was given to the Board and a receipt of their acknowledgment is on file in the Clerk's office.

Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Horacek to reappoint Dan Stankoski as Highway Superintendent for 2015. Roll Call: AYES–Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Jarecke; NAYS–None. Motion carried.

Dan Stankoski, Highway Superintendent, gave road updates to the Board. He reports that NIRMA approved a grant from the 2014 Assist campaign to pay for one-half of the cost (\$2,500.00) of an excavator quick coupler and one-half the cost (\$86.25) of safety decals; dept. worked on snow removal last week; N 470th,

N 480th St. and S 590th St. were a few of the main roads that were plugged; doing a lot of shop work; will begin removal of trees & brush when weather warms up; will begin gravel stockpiling out West; the question of a port a pot for the shed out West was discussed. Board agreed it would be best to purchase a port a pot. Stankoski has been working on the 1 & 6 year plan and would like to hold the hearing at the February 10th meeting, if board agrees. Board agrees.

After the November election, only one person elected to the Cedar Township Board agreed to accept the nomination. Pursuant to §32-567(4), when there are two or more vacancies, the vacancies will be filled by the County Board. Ryan Sonderup and Joe Malander were two board members who had served on the last term. Discussion held. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Voichoskie to appoint Ryan Sonderup and Joe Malander to the Cedar Township Board. Roll Call: AYES-Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Megan Zoucha, County Assessor, and Mary Baldridge, Zoning Administrator, came before the board to discuss unreported buildings in the county. The assessor's office is doing rural reviews of improved parcels for the next two years. They will be using new aerial pictures from the FSA and GIS. They have already found buildings on three parcels that have not been reported to the zoning administrator or the assessor's office. They questioned the board on how they would like to handle the violations. County Attorney has checked into this and has found a statute that states the buildings should be back-taxed and a fine issued. The board agrees that the situation should be handled according to statute. They will be using previous aerial maps to define when the building was constructed.

Christopher Hays and Grant Miller are present for the discussion on the appointment of Nance County Surveyor. Both individuals submitted proposals. Miller's proposal was slightly higher than Hays' proposal. Discussion held. Moved by Ditter to appoint Christopher Hays as Surveyor. Motion dies for lack of a second. Additional discussion. Moved by Small and seconded by Horacek to appoint Grant Miller as Nance County Surveyor for the 2015-2018 term. Roll Call: AYES-Small, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson; NAYS-Ditter, Jarecke. Motion carried.

Mary Baldridge, Zoning Administrator, came before the board to further discuss Livestock Friendly County designation. Also present are Craig Frenzen, Emil Dubas, Jim Knopik and Dana Peterson. Steve Martin with Department of Agriculture had read over Nance County's Zoning Regulations and found a few things that the County would have to justify, due to the fact that as they read now, we may not qualify. Discussion held. Baldridge stated that the Planning and Zoning Committee are going to discuss this again at their next meeting. Board agreed to wait and see what recommendation the P & Z Committee come up with.

Three zoning commissioner's terms are up. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Voichoskie to reappoint Chuck Delancey, Galen Frenzen and Delmar Wondercheck to a three-year term on the zoning committee. Roll Call: Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

General Assistance Rules are up for review. Baldridge reviewed the 2015 Federal poverty guidelines and inflation rates for 2013 & 2014 and adjusted the guidelines to reflect those changes. She went over the new figures with the board.

RESOLUTION #15-1

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-132, it is the duty of the county board of each county to provide general assistance to all poor persons who are eligible; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-133, all counties are required to adopt written standards of eligibility and assistance for general assistance to poor persons; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-134, all counties must review their standards on a biennial basis to insure that such standards reflect changes in living standards and cost-of-living,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Supervisors of Nance County that Nance County Resolution #13-1 known as the Rules for the Administration of General Assistance approved and adopted on January 22, 2013 hereby be repealed; and,



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Supervisors of Nance County that the Rules for the Administration of General Assistance, updated in January 2015, fulfill the county's obligations to poor people as set out by law and are hereby adopted. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Horacek to approve said resolution. Roll Call: AYES-Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Board discussed holding a recognition dinner annually to recognize employees who have served the county for many years or who have achieved goals that should be recognized. They suggested holding such a dinner at the end of each year. Neb. Rev. Stat. §13-2203 (2)(iii) provides for expenditure of public funds for one recognition dinner each year held for elected and appointed officials, employees, or volunteers of the local government. Maximum cost per person for such dinner shall not exceed \$25.00. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Carlson to hold an annual recognition dinner beginning in December 2015. Roll Call: AYES-Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Stankoski had reported at the December 9th meeting of a resident who had dug a trench across a road to help drain a field. The trench was a danger to travelers and the road department put in a tube and filled in the trench. Rod Wetovick made contact with the resident and discussed making restitution to the county for the damages. Wetovick acknowledges that he did receive compensation from the resident for the damages he caused. He will not pursue the matter any further.

Board recesses for lunch.

1:00 p.m. meeting convenes.

Board discusses options to health insurance, due to the fact that CoOportunity has had its certificate of authority suspended by the Nebraska Department of Insurance. Present are Chad Svoboda and John Boeder with Strong Financial and Dennis Maggart with NACO Benefits Services, Clair Jones and several employees. Strong Financial presented the board with options from BCBS, United Healthcare and Coventry. Their options were discussed. The Board had previously received options from NACO Benefits Services, but Mr. Maggart would not verify the quotes, due to the fact that he was not certain that the county would qualify for the rates. Rates are different for employers with under 50 employees than they are for employers with over 50 employees. Strong financial was certain their rates are the rates that the county would receive if the county chose any of their options. Further discussion held. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Carlson to stay with Strong Financial and choose the BCBS#18 option for health insurance. Roll Call: AYES-Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Voichoskie; NAYS-Ditter, Jarecke. Motion carried. All options submitted reflect a substantial increase in health insurance rates. It was decided that the Building, Insurance, Employee Review committee will meet Friday @ 6:00 p.m. to discuss if the county will expect the employee to pay a share of the increase and if so, how much. The committee will report back to the board at the next board meeting.

SuAnn Engel, deputy clerk, informed the board that the service fees for the Cafeteria Plan has increased an additional dollar. The fee is now \$5.00 per employee who is enrolled in the cafeteria plan.

Zarek reports to the board that Tom Smith, Emergency Manager, has also applied for NIRMA ASSIST funds and he has received approval of 50% of the cost of weather radios (155.93); a lump sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of an AED; and 50% of the cost of fire extinguishers (\$128.34).

The Board reviewed and approved the Monthly Fee reports of the County Clerk in the amount of \$2,541.91; Clerk of the District Court in the amount of \$1,751.33.

Tom Smith, Region 44 Emergency Manager, came before the board and presented a Mass Warning and Notification System Policy. He would like to do a campaign to the public to make them aware that the community sirens are not only for tornados. Discussion also held on the purchase of a new emergency manager vehicle. He will further discuss the new vehicle with his supervisory committee. A vehicle has been included in this year's budget.

10:00 Rod Wetovick, County Attorney, is present. Voichoskie is excused.

10:00 Chairman opens the One & Six Year Road Plan hearing. Dan Stankoski, Highway Superintendent, is present. Stankoski provided copies of the one & six year map to the board and went through each project separately. There are 14 projects on the one year plan and 8 projects on the six year plan.

The Beaver Township Board received a letter from a resident regarding closing a road in the township. Stankoski will remind the township that if they are in agreement with the road closing, they will need to make a request to the Board of Supervisors in writing to start the process.

Wetovick reports that Mark Stock has the paperwork for signature on the bridge project #63-114. Just waiting for its return. He suggested going ahead with the letting.

Brett Houtby comes before the board to inquire about the road maintenance out in his area. Stankoski explained that he has a new grader operator out in that area and it is taking him a little longer getting over the roads. He will speak with him.

Mary Baldridge, Zoning/Economic Development Administrator, comes before the board to make the board aware of LB106 – Livestock Operation Siting Act. First hearing on the bill will be held this Thursday. She feels if passed, it will give the State the authority to override zoning laws when it comes to siting of LFOs. If passed, the State will establish a Matrix, which will be provided to each county, for them to use when making a decision to approve or deny an LFO. If the county denies an LFO application, the applicant can appeal the decision to a board set up by the State. Information on the bill was handed out. Baldridge has spoken to other zoning administrators and they are opposed to the bill. Galen Frenzen spoke in favor of the bill. He states that the bill is trying to get some continuity throughout the State without taking away the county's authority. If an applicant is denied, they would have to prove that the county acted unreasonable, arbitrary or showed an abuse of discretion to overturn the county zoning board decision. Craig Frenzen also spoke in support LB106. He added that Steve Pritchard, Nance County Extension Agent, has information that shows a cow/calf production system on dry lots using distillers and cornstalks for feed costs less than pasturing. He would like to see young farmers back in Nance County and the dry lot system is a good way to get in them in the business. Discussion is held. Baldridge states that the zoning committee opposes the legislation and have



asked her to write a letter in opposition. Anyone is welcome to attend and testify at the hearing. Board will stay undecided and see where the bill goes.

11:00 a.m. One & Six Year Road Plan hearing closed.

Discussion held. When asked for his opinion, McDonald suggested the precast concrete plank bridge. It would have the least maintenance. River debris could cause damage, along with blockage with the other structures; fixing the bridge would not increase the weight limit; low water crossing would take maintenance each time there was measurable rain. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Cornwell to replace the collapsed bridge with a precast plank bridge. Frenzen then called ex-senator, Brom, who stated that "it upsets him very much" and assured Frenzen several times that it was never said and it bothers him that this absolute falsehood was in the handout. Mary Baldridge, Zoning Administrator, submitted the information, and stated that the statement came from a written report that Darla Svoboda, Hamilton County Zoning Administrator for many years, circulated to her county board and zoning commission and all zoning administrators. Baldridge considers her a reliable source and has no reason to suspect her of fabricating the statement. Baldridge went on-line to seek something to support or repute the statement but found nothing. She can't explain the discrepancy. She states it is her job to gather as much information as possible from all perspectives. The report included all pros and cons to becoming LFC designated and she does not feel the



statement had any effect on the decision of the Nance County Board of Supervisors not to seek LFC designation. Jan Frenzen is also present and as a producer and mother of 3 daughters, who have had great experiences in livestock agriculture, she hopes the opportunity is available to them in the future to come back and be a part of their operation if they decide to. Frenzen also feels that LB106 needs to have a scientific basis and believes that that is expressly the plan. She feels strongly that science needs to be the basis in agriculture.

Dave Moore is present to discuss the law enforcement contract with the City of Fullerton. At their last meeting the City Council voted to not renew such contract. Jarecke distributed a letter he received from the Fullerton City Council giving official written notice of non-renewal of the law enforcement services contract with the County. Moore believes the city would like to cut the manpower provided by the County. But he feels that if we cut the manpower for the city, we will be cutting our own throat. He reported that number of crimes in 2013 were cut in half from 2010. Board will wait and see what the city will propose. It was decided to set up a subcommittee of two persons from the city council and two persons from the board of supervisors to discuss a solution and bring it back before the board. Horacek and Cornwell agreed to serve on said sub-committee.

He received a review form for Tom Smith on his performance over the past year and being a newly elected supervisor asked for the board's opinion of Smith's job performance. Neva Umstead with the Fullerton Area Senior Center came before the board regarding the Nance-Trans budget numbers. They are requesting that the Board of Supervisors continue to budget \$9,000.00 to help support the Nance-Trans. She additionally presented a list of the number of boardings and trips from July 2014-February 2015. Board will consider the request. Umstead also presented the board with a Proclamation from the Nebraska Association of Transportation Providers, proclaiming the 2nd week in April as Public Transit week. She reported that they have several things planned that week. They are also planning an open house for Tuesday, April 14th. She invited the board to attend. Moved by Carlson and seconded by Voichoskie to sign the proclamation. Roll Call: AYES-Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Cornwell, Jarecke; NAYS-None; ABSENT-Horacek. Motion carried.

Dan Stankoski. Road foreman, gave updates in the road department: Cleaning ditches; have culverts to open up; Sewer in road shop has been fixed; continue to haul gravel & rock on main roads; Wetovick questioned Baldridge as to residents requesting Conditional Use Permits(CUP) to haul manure from outside the county. She said "CUPs are not always requested". There is a situation south of town where manure has been hauled in and has caused damage to the soft roads. Wetovick stated it is important for residents to request the CUP in order to alert the road department and extra maintenance can be given to the affected roads. Topkote Inc. out of Yankton SD will be in our area in the next couple of weeks. He asked the board if they would like to get them to seal the cracks on S555th St.. Board agrees. Drainage issue on N440th St. is discussed. It is a dam site that is being farmed. The FSA office considers it as an artificial wetland. It can be farmed and drained. It has not been drained in many years. Stankoski contacted Brian McDonald with JEO and his advice was to do nothing. Board agreed. Stankoski also talked to McDonald regarding projects #63(114) and #63(213). McDonald will attend the April 14, 2015 meeting to discuss moving forward with these projects. He does not think it is likely that the work on these projects would begin until this fall. Also felt that the paving project on the sale barn road #63(204) could begin in April, weather permitting. Stankoski asked the board about advertising for summer help. The board agreed. The position should be part-time, but could turn into a full-time job. Jarecke reported that a sign is missing on the road North of Norman Koza's residence. A resident also reported on a road that is rough. It was discussed to run a notice in the local papers reminding



farmers NOT to plant their crops in the road right-of-way. Discussion held on signs along county roads. Present is Mary Baldridge, zoning administrator. She did some research and reports that signs placed along county roads are required to be 15' past the road ROW. This is more than likely for permanent signs. She is not sure if this also pertains to temporary signs. Employee evaluations were completed by the board members on Stankoski. Stankoski reviewed and signed the evaluations.

Tom Smith reported on the approved Nirma ASSIST funds. Funds were approved for weather radios, fire extinguishers and an AED for a total of \$784.27. If purchased, the county would need to provide \$1,330.79 and Smith asked where the funds for these purchases could come from. The board suggested that funds for the radios and fire extinguishers be paid for out of each office that is to receive the devices. Purchases will be paid from the Inheritance Tax Fund and if possible paid back at the end of the budget year.

Smith also presented information on a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training. He would like to offer training to county employees. He brought the training before the Safety committee and they felt it would be a valuable benefit for the county and employees. This is a 20 hour course. The Safety committee suggested holding 1 hour sessions over the noon hour until complete, offering lunch to those attending. Discussion held. The Board felt it would be a good program and they will support it. They also felt the sessions should be at least 2 hours in length. After discussion the board asked that he take this back to the safety committee to work out the details. Smith will send out a survey to county employees to see what interest there is in the training.

There was some confusion on the sheriff's work hours when talking to NIRMA legal counsel. Zarek reports that at the Northeast District meeting held Friday, a representative from the Nebraska Department of Labor gave a presentation. When asked if there was any problem with the County allowing the deputies to work 160 hours per month, instead of the 171 hours per 28 day period, the representative responded that it was acceptable. There was a discussion on the contract with the City of Fullerton. The city council has set up a committee and the board of supervisors have set up a committee. The two committees will meet Monday, March 30, to discuss the contract between the City and the Nance County Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff's department would like to see better communication between the City and themselves.

Board received an easement request from Marlin and Kelly Scott to run a 2" water line under N. 465th St. in Section 2, starting in the NE¼ and crossing into the SE½. Discussion held. Moved by Cornwell and seconded by Ditter to approve said easement. Roll Call: AYES-Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Jarecke; NAYS-None; ABSENT-Horacek. Motion carried.

10:00 Dan Stankoski, Highway Superintendent, present. Chairman opened the road closing hearing. Discussion held. Hearing remains open.

Updates: Do to the lack of response from bridge contractors, Brian McDonald, engineer, feels the county should put off bridge projects C63-114 and bridge #20820 till the fall and be ready for early spring start date. He suggested moving forward with one or two box culverts this year (#63(190) and #63(205)). Board agrees; finishing up laying out dirt and putting in ditch on N 150th Ave; put tube extension on N 280th Ave; new driveway tube for Butch Klassen; dept. has a quarter of a mile of dirt to lay on S 310th Ave and .7 of a mile to dig on valley road; ditch on S 240th Ave needs to be cleaned; ordering culverts for projects 209, 210, & 211. Frank Konwinski has requested a driveway tube. Road department can dig up and raise, if that is what he wants. If the tube is in bad shape and needs replaced, Konwinski will need to pay for the cost of new tube.





Department has received 3 job applications; Stankoski will set up interviews with the applicants and the committee for next week; Stankoski attending bridge conference in Kearney this week.

Joe Swantek came before the board to request that, if possible, the county get ahold of some of the asphalt millings from the State on the Hwy 22 project. He would then like the county to lay the millings on the remaining .3 mile by his residence. He received permission from the county to blacktop the road in front of his residence some 25 years ago. And 3 yrs ago he received some millings from the State and the county helped lay the millings and it has all worked fine. He feels he has saved the county a lot of money as the County has not had to gravel or maintain the road due to this. Discussion held. It is questionable whether any of the millings will be available, but the board will look into it.

Carla Cunningham came before the board regarding water drainage on valley road. Water coming off the hill comes down a waterway and is supposed to go through a culvert onto their land and/or continue on down the ditch. A field driveway that was obviously put in by landowner several years ago did not have a tube placed under the driveway and therefore, all the water coming down off the hill is forced under the road and onto their field. They lost a lot of topsoil from the last rain. Stankoski said he looked over the situation and plans on rebuilding the road and doing some ditch work. Discussion held. Stankoski will have Brian McDonald come and look at the situation and decide the best solution. Stankoski feels the county may need to start a permitting process for landowners/tenants to be able to put in field driveways, as there are several in the county.

Larry Cherry is present and gives testimony on the road vacation.

Board discussed the fees the county pays for indigent residents. Also present are George Palmer and Jonathan and Brittany Santin. The fee has been \$1,000.00 per burial for many years and now does not always cover the costs. A survey of counties shows that most counties pay over \$1,500.00 per burial Discussion held. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Voichoskie to increase the fee from \$1,000.00 to \$1,500.00.

Mary Baldridge came before the board to request the purchase of a picnic table for the use of employees/ customers of the courthouse. Jarecke has a spare picnic table that he is willing to donate to the county. Baldridge inquired about purchasing some benches to set near the front entrance for use during court days. Horacek stated the benches would need to be bolted down to the cement.

Further discussion held on the Nance-Trans budget request. If possible the board will work the request into the 2015-2016 budget.

Mark Headrick, representative with Washington National, came before the board to request the opportunity to meet with county employees to discuss supplemental insurance policies. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Voichoskie to allow Mr. Headrick to meet with the county employees to offer supplemental insurance policies. WHEREAS, testimony heard in favor of and opposition to the vacation of the above described Nance County road.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Nance County Board of Supervisors that the Nance County road described as:

A road running for ½ mile East and West lying between Sections 30 and 31 of East Beaver Township,, Range 3, Township 18 N, West of the 6th P.M., in Northeast Nance County, Nebraska, and, be vacated effective April 14, 2015 and said road revert back to adjoining landowners.

Public hearing for a Conditional Use Permit for Mike Ridder to spread manure from Merrick County onto the NW½NW½ 22-16-5. Present is Mary Baldridge, Zoning Administrator. Discussion held. Baldridge explained the zoning amendments as recommended by the planning & zoning commission: Amend setbacks for environmentally controlled housing operations to be identical to open lot operations (1/4 mile - 1,320 ft.).

Amend to increase the size of proposed LFO Animal Units requiring permit from 301 to 501. Currently if you have 300 animal units or less you do not need a permit. The recommendation is change this from the current 300 animal units to 500 animal units. Animal Units of 501-1,000 would require a permit.

Amend to allow LFOs South of the Loup River, pending DEQ approval.

Jim Knopik made several points to the board: when zoning regulations were adopted, one of the considerations was the amount of waste the animals produce; the DEQ is comprised of a 16 member panel of which only 2 or 3 represent the people of Nebraska the others are involved with large industries; he feels by raising the number of animal units from 301 to 501, we are taking away the rights of people living on the rural residences. And we need to uphold the quality of life. He would appreciate the time to gather more information to present to the board before adopting the amended zoning regulations. Ditter states he is not opposed to giving more time, but the commission has put time into this and he doesn't want to second guess their decision. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Ditter to adopt the LFO regulations of the Zoning regulations. Roll Call: AYES-Horacek, Carlson, Ditter, Jarecke; NAYS-Cornwell, Small, Voichoskie. Motion carried.

Dave Moore, County Sheriff, reports on a meeting held between himself, 2 board members, 2 city council members and the mayor regarding the sheriff contract with the City of Fullerton. The City would like to drop the contract from 2.5 deputies to 1.5 deputies. Moore does not feel this would be sufficient to man the City. One of the complaints by the city council is communication. Moore says he will attend more city council meetings for better communication. Another complaint is the city has nothing showing what the department is doing for them. Moore will prepare some sort of a log, showing what is being done for the city. Moore feels the group had a good discussion. They will continue to work on the issues through the end of the contract. Moore additionally feels that we should not compromise on the contract; either stay with the 2.5 manpower for the city or the city get their own police department. The City wondered what the county would charge them if they hired the dispatch to handle the city, if they went on their own. Moore feels that one-third of the calls in the county come from the City of Fullerton, one-third from Genoa and one-third from rural. Belgrade has a few calls. Board agrees that the charge for dispatch would be 1/3 of the budget for the dispatch services.

Sheriff's department has used light bars and Merrick County has agreed to purchase for \$200.00. If we hold on to them they will sit in the basement. Board agreed to sell.

Tom Dinsdale, Bill Davis and Tyler Walkowiak came before the board for approval of a liquor license for the Thunder on the Loup event to be held July 31st through August 2nd. Discussion held. Moved by Small and seconded by Carlson to approve a liquor license for the Thunder on the Loup event to be held July 31, August 1 and August 2, 2015. LFOs will now be allowed throughout Nance County, pending DEQ approval; 2) Increasing the size of LFOs that require a permit from 301 to 501 Animal Units (AU). Previously if you had 300 AU or less, you did not need a permit. The amendment changes this from 300 AU to 500 AU. AU of 501-1,000 will still require a permit; and 3) Changing setbacks for Environmentally Controlled Housing operations (or CAFOs) in the 501-1,000 AU range to be identical to Open Lot operations (¼ mile = 1,320 ft.); Discussion held. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Horacek to approve said resolution. Roll Call: AYES-Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried. The full resolution can be viewed at the Clerk's office during regular business hours.

The Nance County Board of Supervisors met for a special meeting on May 5, 2015 at the Nance County Courthouse to discuss an amendment to Nance County Zoning Regulations pertaining to a reduction of the setback for Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO's) of 1,001 – 2,500 animal units (AU) from 1 mile to ½ mile, which is the current setback for Open Lot Operations of the same size for Livestock Feeding Operations (LFO). Members present are Dennis Jarecke, Andrew Ditter, Robert Voichoskie, Ralph Horacek, Timothy Cornwell, James Carlson and Robert Small. Also present is Danette Zarek, Nance County Clerk, Mary Baldridge, Nance County Zoning Administrator, and 11 members of the public.

Notice of the meeting was given thereof by publication in the Nance County Journal and the Genoa Leader Times on April 22, 2015.

Notice of the meeting was given to the Board and a receipt of their acknowledgment is on file in the Clerk's office.

9:00 a.m. Chairman called the meeting to order.

Moved by Cornwell and seconded by Voichoskie to approve the agenda. Roll Call: AYES-Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Moved by Carlson and seconded by Small to approve the minutes from the April 28, 2015 meeting. Roll Call: AYES: Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Baldridge gave a summary of stalemate points of discussion made at the Planning and Zoning meeting held the evening of Monday, May 4, 2015: 1) Look at regulations and set-backs. Instead of having uniform setbacks based according to animal units take other factors into consideration, such as how manure is handled; 2) Look at the odor foot print tool as Greeley and Howard County do; 3) Look at whether pits are in building or outdoors. Other comments: Leave the waiver of distance as a self-policing mechanism instead of changing setbacks. This gives all stakeholders a say in the matter. Animal units were clarified for everyone: one unit = 1 cow or 2.5 hogs. The animal unit was based on 1,000 pounds of weight. Some say the odor foot print tool is not true. Odor near hog units comes from all wind directions. Living next to an LFO and having to deal with the odor is no different than living near a factory and having to deal with traffic. Some people have a problem with absentee producers-they put up the LFO but don't live there with the consequences. The Planning and Zoning Board and Board of Supervisors had recently changed the setbacks for open and closed LFO for 501-1000 AU to be the same (1/4 mile) that IS livestock friendly. The county is moving in the right direction. Cattle operations are exterior. They get their odor from moisture-lagoons are no different. Agree that we want local producers to get a start, but not at their neighbor's expense; this will cause a loss in the rural population, deflation of property value and environmental consequences. This is a very difficult issue.

At the end of the planning and zoning meeting a motion was made and seconded to leave the zoning regulation setbacks for CAFOs as they are currently-one mile for 1001-5000 animal units. Seven members voted yea, one member abstained and one member was absent.

Chairman asked if anyone had questions or comments for today's public hearing.

Pro comments:

The county is looking for economic development. Emotions should not be used when making economic decisions. Livestock operations bring in tax money and jobs. Need to realize that Nance County is agricultural. Need to support industry to keep our communities from dwindling. Look at the long-term big picture. The waiver of distance IS a good tool as is the odor foot print tool, which was built by the University of Nebraska. This tool takes the emotion out of the decision. The category of 1,001-5,000 AU needs to be divided and new set-backs set. When the board changed the setback of the Environmentally Controlled Housing (ECH) operations to be the same as Open Lot Operations (OPEN) they have shown that Nance County is Livestock Friendly.

Cons comments:

Livestock producers do not buy their feed locally. Large livestock facilities prohibit family growth. The economic value brought into the county by livestock facilities is limited and devalues homes in the area. The area South of 63A Link is becoming more residential. These homes bring in a lot of tax money and need to be considered when livestock facilities go up. Argument on health issues caused by livestock facilities. Isn't the quality of life worth more than money? Can't we bring in other industries such as the sand plant and ADM? Other comments:

The 1001-5000 AU category should be split into two categories (1,001-2,500 & 2,501-5,000). Look at the odor foot print tool, built by UNL (some think it is a great tool, others disagree).



Another good tool – waiver of distance.

This decision should not be made based on emotions.

County residents, grain farmers, livestock producers, community businesses, need to work together. It is impossible to make everyone happy, but we need to find a balance.

Grain farmers and livestock producers need to look at supply and demand for both grain and livestock. Hogs currently have a low profit margin. Maybe the livestock producer should feed out each hog an additional 10 pounds before selling; Maybe grain farmers should find a way to reduce the amount of bushels raised so there is a demand & prices raise.

Jarecke pointed out that Filmore County has a 4,000 head dairy and their setbacks are ½ mile. Nance County has missed out on a lot of livestock industry due to Nance County being known as livestock Unfriendly. Cornwell states he was approached years ago by someone wanting to expand a dairy, but when they realized Cornwell's land was in Nance County, he changed his mind. Also at one time he looked into building a hog unit himself, but the environmental company found out it was in Nance County and they discouraged him. The P & Z committee did their research and we should not second guess their decision. Their job is not easy.

Moved by Ditter and seconded by Small to approve the planning and zoning committee's recommendation and leave the regulations as they are. Roll Call: AYES-Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Carlson, Small; NAYS-Cornwell, Jarecke. Motion carried.

Board received an easement request from Marlin and Kelly Scott to run a 6" irrigation pipe and electric line under N. 465th St. in Section 2, Township 17 North, Range 7. Discussion held. Moved by Cornwell and seconded by Ditter to approve said easement. Roll Call: AYES-Cornwell, Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Dan Stankoski, Highway Superintendent gave road updates: Project 63(213) bid from Ed Hoevet was discussed. This bid was the lowest bid of those submitted and opened at the last meeting. Moved by Carlson and seconded by Voichoskie to award the bid to Ed Hoevet, less the cost of painting. Contract price without painting is \$202,226.18. Roll call: Carlson, Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell, Jarecke; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Discussion held on project 63(190). The project can be handled 3 ways; twin concrete box culverts-cost \$60,000-\$70,000; twin 96"x46' squashed pipe with headwalls-cost \$30,000-\$35,000; or twin 96"x60' squashed pipe w/o headwalls-cost \$15,000-\$20,000 (materials only). Board discussed whether they would need to make this a cattle pass or not. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Cornwell to complete the project with twin 96"x60' squashed pipe. Further discussion. Roll Call: AYES-Horacek, Cornwell, Carlson; NAYS-Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Jarecke. Motion fails. received from Hellbusch Electric (\$1,477.84) for electric work to the garage. Sims explains that the electrical will come off the electric pole in the back of the courthouse and run to the garage. Board members would rather have the electrical run directly from the electrical box in the courthouse so as not to incur a separate monthly charge from the electric company.

Also questioned whether the county was going to sell or keep the small shed previously built. Some board members thought it was decided to sell it and others thought it would be kept. No decision made at this time.

Discussion held on W. County Road in Genoa in which semis have been traveling due to the road work in Genoa. The bridge on this road has a weight limit of 16 ton. Dan Stankoski. Road foreman, gave updates in the road department: Stop sign study at the intersection of S570th St. and S 380th Ave. will be complete by next meeting. The East/West traffic will more than likely have stop signs and the North/South traffic will drive through intersection w/o stop sign – The road department and some board members have received complaints regarding the windrowing on the roads. The road department will continue to work the windrows back and forth across the road as they dry/rot to maintain the road widths throughout the county — Stankoski has contacted landowners regarding the mowing of the ditches and reports that only two ditches remain unmowed -- Stankoski would like to build a room of some type in the road building out west to house the DEF additive for the motor grader to keep it from freezing this winter. Options were discussed -- The ownership of the building on the county lot in Genoa is still unknown. Will need to further look into the ownership/lease. If the county does not own the whole building, NIRMA will not insure it – Ed Hoevet Excavating has the west abutment, center pier and west backwall in for the replacement of the collapsed bridge. Pictures were passed around – Department is putting a tube across the intersection of N460th St. and N310th Ave. – a tube extension is needed on N. Husk Road.

Lot exchange is discussed with Rick Collins. The Board had decided to ask Collins to pay the county the cost of ½ of the fence and ½ of the rock, estimating that cost to be \$7,500.00. Collins informed the board that there is a cost of approximately \$3,770.00 for unbilled electricity that the County owes per an agreement made at the time he purchased the old road building. After discussion, Collins suggested that the amount of \$2,500.00 be deducted from the \$7,500.00 to offset the electricity bill. Collins will remove the trees and house from the lot he owns and fill in the basement with dirt, leaving the County with an empty, level lot. Collins will retain the fuel tanks and will assume any liability for any contamination issues, if they exist. All are in agreement with the terms. Wetovick will draw up an agreement. A Notice of a Public meeting will run in the



next two issues of the county newspapers to allow the public to attend the hearing to support or oppose to the lot exchange.

11:00 Conditional Use Permit (CUP) hearing is opened. Mary Baldridge, Zoning Administrator, is present. Baldridge informs the board that the Planning and Zoning Committee recommends that the CUP for Mike Rolf to spread manure from Merrick County on land in Nance County be approved. There will not be any stockpiling of the product to be spread. Discussion held. Moved by Cornwell and seconded by Horacek to approve the CUP for Mike Rolf. The county would still need to know the haul route, stock-piling location and surrounding landowners would be contacted and given time to respond, but it would speed up the process for the feedlot and landowner. JEO Consulting is also being recognized on the project. Department is shredding brush and trees – going through the equipment and doing maintenance – hauling gravel. Discussion on whether or not to contract fuel. Board decided to wait until after the first of the year. Stankoski asked whether the board feels the dirt scraper should be kept or if it should be sold. The department has not used the scraper in 4 years. It was decided it would be best to sell. It will be advertised for sealed bids.

Jarecke had invited the fire districts to the meeting to discuss the Mutual Finance Organization. Members of the Genoa Fire Department, Belgrade Fire Department, City of Fullerton, and City of Genoa were present. The Genoa Fire District would like to see the mill levy dropped down to 1.5 cents or less. With the building of a new fire hall in Fullerton, there was concern that Fullerton would like to keep it up a little, but Fullerton Fire Department was not present or represented. It was also suggested that the Fullerton Fire Department could take out a bond to help pay the cost of the building. The annual Mutual Finance Organization meeting is set for February 18, so it was suggested that those present think about the options, discuss them amongst each other and bring their thoughts to the meeting.

Prairie Creek Township officers, Robert Konwinski and Dale Lassek, were present along with Shane Czarnick. Some concerns of the township were gravel on roads and the stop sign recently put up at the intersection of S570th St. and 380th Ave. They would've liked to have had some input on the decision of where





to place the stop sign. The board explained that the County had to have a study done and then had to follow the recommendations, which led to the stop signs being placed so traffic traveling East and West were stopped and traffic traveling South and North would not be stopped. The concerns of the road department and the board is that if the township plans on rebuilding roads, that the road standards for the road classifications be followed. Road maintenance agreement between Nance County and Prairie Creek discussed. Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Ditter to sign said agreement. With the deadline for the grant coming up soon, it was decided that it was too late to take it on this year, but should keep it in mind for next year.
