Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney present.

Tony Bernt, road foreman, gave updates in the road department. Now that frost is coming out of the ground, blade operators are blading in the mornings and cutting trees in the afternoon – Looking for a way to deice the black tops and have found a salt truck that Joe Malander would sell for \$9,200.00. It is a 2003 international with 55,000 miles. They have demoed it and it seems to work as it should. The truck could also be used to fill in holes on roadways, pull the flatbed trailer etc. Discussion held. Moved by Small and seconded by Ditter to purchase the truck from Joe Malander for the price of \$9,200.00. Roll Call: AYES-Small, Nelson, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke, Cornwell; NAYS-None. Motion carried – Have looked at bridge on a minimum maintenance road east of Bob Small's residence with Ed Hoevet (Hoevet Excavating) and Chris Lane (Speece/Lewis). Have a couple of options: repair with 5 new wooden stringers; repair with new metal stringers, repair with additional set of pilings @ 20' spans; make it a low water crossing. The headwalls are okay. Board tabled the decision until costs are received for the options.

Bids were opened on Belgrade East Project #C63(132). The following bids were received: Midwest Service & Sales Co. \$29,460.60 for culvert pipe and \$28,200.08 for headwall for a total of \$57,660.68. Material delivery date 3/29/19; Contech Engineered Solutions \$32,338.80 for culvert pipe and \$29,160.00 for headwall for a total of \$61,498.80. Material delivery date: 8-12 weeks; and Ace Eaton Metals \$31,005.00 for the culvert pipe and \$32,790.92 for the headwalls for a total of \$63,795.92. Material delivery date 4/1/19. The bids will be reviewed by Brian McDonald with JEO prior to the board awarding the bid.

Ramsey Robertson with Manelli Wagner Engineers out of Lincoln, NE came to introduce himself. They would like the board to consider their company when seeking engineering projects.

Terms for Planning and Zoning committee members, Delmer Wondercheck, John Cieloha, Roy Guisinger and Pat Connelly are up. All have agreed to serve another term. Also interested in serving on the committee are Mark Sonderup, Jaysen Melcher and Kendal Sock. Secret ballots were passed out to the board members. Results of the vote are as follows: P. Connelly -7, K. Sock -5, M. Sonderup -5, D. Wondercheck -4, J. Melcher -3, J. Cieloha -3 and R. Guisinger -1. Connelly, Sock, and Sonderup are appointed to the Planning and Zoning committee for a three year term. Wondercheck's term was up in 2018. His reappointment is affirmed for 3 years beginning in 2018.

Board discussed the camera system for the courthouse. Safety Committee Chairman, Ralph Horacek, stated the concerns of the safety committee for the new camera system. Also present is Sean Kerby with Applied Connective. Discussion held. It was decided by the board that the cost to install a new camera system should be looked at and budgeted when preparing the next budget.

Zarek presented updates to the General Assistance manual for discussion. The manual must be updated every 2 years. The update includes a new figure for income resource guidelines, based on 75% of the Poverty Guidelines updated in the Federal Register by DHHS. This raised the figure from \$743 to \$759 for a one person household; from \$1002 to \$1029 for a two person related household; and an additional \$270 for each additional related household member. Figures for maximum payments per month allowed for shelter were figured @ 2.5% inflation increase and raised the figures from \$523 to \$536 for a 1 person household; \$576 to \$590 for a 2 person household; \$628 to \$644 for a 3 person household and \$680 to \$697 for a 4 or more person household. Non-food necessities were figured with a 2.5% inflation increase, and also 10%, 15% & 25% increases. Board approved the increases for income/resource and shelter allowance. They requested that the 2.5% inflation increase be used for the non-food necessities. Zarek will make the requested changes and the board will approve the updated manual at the January 22nd meeting.



Steve Pritchard, UNL Education Educator, gave an update on the usage of the extension meeting room. Some of the organizations using the room are: Robotics club, extension board, 4-H council, 4-H clubs, extension clubs, chamber. The meeting room was used once by the Big Iron for an auction which generated income to the county. The corrections to the improvements are believed to be completed and should be signed off soon. New 4-H building at the fairgrounds is progressing. Timeline to finish is still expected to be late June, early July. Cornwell reports that the city administrator has been in contact with him and it appears that the city is moving forward with the waterline issue.

Tony Bernt, road foreman, gave updates in the road department. Dept. had been hauling concrete & dirt to fix additional sluff offs while the weather was nice – Hauled gravel to cover some bad areas that needed attention. Some areas seem to use more gravel than others, so they have mixed white rock with the gravel in hopes of firming up the road, and conserve gravel stock piles – Now that weather has turned cold, they have been out blading to break up the ice on the gravel. Also have been able to use the new salt truck and everything seems to be working well – Sign inventory is complete. Will begin the process of replacing 911 street signs as soon as they come in – Board discussed Project Belgrade East - C63(132). Bids were reviewed by LeRoy Gerrard and it is recommended to award the project to Midwest Service & Sales, with the lowest bid and earliest material delivery date. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Jarecke to award the project to Midwest Service & Sales with a base bid of \$57,660.68. RESOLUTION #19-1

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-132, it is the duty of the county board of each county to provide general assistance to all poor persons who are eligible; and ,

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-133, all counties are required to adopt written standards of eligibility and assistance for general assistance to poor persons; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>Neb. Rev. Stat.</u> 68-134, all counties must review their standards on a biennial basis to insure that such standards reflect changes in living standards and cost-of-living,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Supervisors of Nance County that Nance County Resolution #17-1 known as the Rules for the Administration of General Assistance approved and adopted on January 24, 2017 hereby be repealed; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Supervisors of Nance County that the Rules for the Administration of General Assistance, updated in January 2019, fulfill the county's obligations to poor people as set out by law and are hereby adopted.

Bakewell updated the board on the communications consolidation with Boone County. The process seems to be moving slowly. Cornwell stated that the Boone County Sheriff was to be meeting with the Boone County Commissioners and he would be contacting Cornwell. He would like to wait to hear back from the sheriff. The cost to Nance County is unknown at this time—He reports that the salt truck is working great and feels it was a great investment—Doing maintenance on truck & trailers, getting ready for spring projects—Doing PM4 service on excavator. Will be back shredding trees once service is done—Hauled concrete from Genoa to stock piles. Will be useful for filling in washouts & help with erosion issues—County resident has an issue with water sitting on his land and wanted to bore/drill under the roadway to drain the water. Wondered if the county would cover some of the cost. Resident was expected to attend today's meeting, but is not present. Board feels that the water issue was caused by the land owner when doing dirt work on the land and the board declined to pay for any of the cost—Board discussed the MMR on N. 160th Ave. with Bernt and asked him to look at the road and see if it is feasible to build it up—Bernt went over the projects on the One & Six Year Road Plan. The plan consists of 6 one-year projects and 9 projects in the six vear plan. Projects were discussed.

Spiral tubes are one piece; Riveted & spot welded are priced with bands: Midwest Sales & Service-Riveted pipe \$27,922.00; Spiral pipe-\$23,800.00. Ace Eaton Metals-Spot Welded \$18,435.30; Spiral pipe \$17,377.39; He will go with the Ace Eaton bid on the spiral if the board is okay with it. Board agrees—Project #217 on Belgrade bottom road-removal of concrete tube with headwalls & replace with tubes; Intersection must be moved to the north to be up to state standards. Olsson Engineering will be surveying this project. Cost for preliminary engineering and sizing culverts is \$3,000.00—Project #214 west of Genoa. There is \$140,000.00 in county soft match funds available. We will be using this for our 20% on preliminary engineering, NEPA & ROW. Construction & construction engineering 20% match would be utilized by state aid bridge funds—Department will continue to fight cold temps and push snow as needed. Board informed Bernt of complaints of a plugged culvert and a driveway culvert with a hole in it. Bernt will look into these.

John Sullivan, Paul Bialas, pool committee members, and Pat Larsen, mayor, came before the board to discuss removal of the swimming pool concrete. The City has decided not to open the pool this summer season, allowing demolition to begin earlier than planned. They asked if the county be willing to take the concrete and haul it away? Also wondered if it would be possible for the county to use their excavator to tear out the concrete. Nelson felt this would take men away from necessary county projects. He also voiced concerns of chairman Cornwell that if the county tore out the concrete, it would be taking away the job opportunity for individual contractors. Group discussed tearing out the concrete while ground is frozen, and before a lot of county projects have begun. The Board agrees to help in any way they can. Sullivan will coordinate the project with Bernt.

Jarecke invited Mayor, Larsen to come in and sit in on board meetings through the year. Both parties could ask or answer questions from each other, keeping the lines of communication open between the two entities. Larsen felt this would be a good practice.

Larsen reported that the fairgrounds lease between the City and the County was tabled at the last city council meeting. The council members were concerned as to an "exclusive rights to parking" clause in the agreement. Wetovick said that the term "exclusive rights" was not used in the agreement, but with the intentions of the new fairgrounds building being rented out, there will be a need for parking to the south of the new building. Larsen also reports that the plans on the new water line that will supply the new building has been approved by the State. The cost comes in at \$129,000.00 and they are moving ahead with the project.

Ryan Nuss with Capital Business Systems came before the board to present information of a managed network service that they provide for businesses. They could come in and do a network assessment of the county office computer networks. Then they could provide network monitoring and backups. Discussion held. Board decided they would like to pass the information on to the office heads and make a decision at a later date.

Brian Wegener came before the board to discuss boring under N440th St. near 380th Ave. N440th St. is much higher than the farm ground, and the culvert under the road is further down the road and does not drain the field. Discussion held. There may have been a cement culvert under the road many years ago, but no one is certain. Bernt will contact a landowner who has owned land to the south for many years to see what he remembers. If there was something there that could be dug out and get back in working order, it would be the most cost effective. If no other solution, the board has agreed that they would share one-half of the cost to bore an 8" hole tube under the roadway to drain the field.

Further discussion held on presentation of Capital Business Systems. Zarek has checked with officials and office heads and each is doing their own backups and do not feel this service is necessary. Bakewell also does not recommend their services at this time. Board chooses to decline the managed network services at this time.

The Board reviewed and approved the County Treasurer's Miscellaneous Receipts #19010087 & 19020001 through 19020042 in the amount of \$683,475.56 for the month of February, 2019.

Steve Pritchard, UNL educator, and Ashley Boryca, office manager, came before the board with information on the new fairgrounds exhibit building. Pritchard reports that the building is now weather tight. A heater has been placed in the building to thaw out and dry the ground. They should be able to pour concrete in a couple of weeks. Plumbers and electricians should be able to get in next week.—Boryca submitted suggested rental rates for the new fairgrounds exhibit building. Rental rates in place for buildings in Boone, Merrick and Butler Counties were compared. Those rates were used in calculating the suggested rates for the new exhibit building—Boryca checked again on prices for tables and chairs. Original quote received was \$12,000.00. After going on line for price match, the cost now is \$8,264.00, which includes 20 tables, 112 chairs, racks for both the tables and chairs, and freight. Extension office will check to see where someone could rent additional tables and chairs if someone renting the building would require more than the 20 tables & 160 chairs available.—An epoxy finish on the floors was considered, but it was decided to stick with the polished concrete.—Next decision will be on the walk-in cooler. A decision on that will need to be made before the plumbing/electrical is done.—A couple of fund-raisers have been planned: Selling t-shirts and participation in the city-wide garage sales.—Pritchard passed out a flyer with disaster relief/hay & fencing donation site information. Additional information was offered by board members, so Pritchard will update the flyer. They ask that any donations of hay & fencing materials or requests for any of the supplies go through Boryca at the extension office.

Moved by Nelson and seconded by Horacek to approve the rental rates submitted by the extension office. Roll call: AYES-Nelson, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke, Small, Cornwell; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Tony Bernt, road foreman, gave updates in the road department. Department has been hauling, dirt, gravel and rock as fast as they can on roads to make them passable. They have local truckers hauling rock in. They will continue working 12 hour days as needed. Dept. will be moving up by Randy Dodds' place to fix the approach on the bridge south of his home. Dodds is not able to get out except for a minimum maintenance road, that is barely passable. Cornwell has been told by Chris with Speece Lewis Engineers that all flood damage repairs done on all main graveled/collector roads that are repaired within 180 days of the damage



could get 100% reimbursement. Discussion held on hiring several workers that may only be able to work 1 or 2 days a week if they do not get enough applications for full-time workers. Bernt received bids from Speece Lewis Engineers for engineering on replacement of the Belgrade South bridge (\$75,000.00), damaged in the flooding. If permitting is necessary it could run a little more; and on replacement of the N. Key Road bridge (\$65,000.00), also damaged in the flooding. It is also noted that the bridge north of Richard Hellbusch needs work done; Also a bridge on the Skedee Creek needs to be looked at. Bernt reports that Valley Road is now open. Most roads south of the river are becoming impassable due to vehicles driving on them. The department has been hauling rock out to the various impassable areas, but with vehicles unnecessarily driving on these roads, the rock is doing no good.

Allen Chlopek, Zoning Administrator, is present for a Lot Split hearing for Keith Bittner to split off 9.068 acres in Section 19, Township 16 North, Range 6, Nance County. Discussion held. Moved by Jarecke and seconded by Horacek to approve said lot split for Keith Bittner. Roll Call: AYES-Jarecke, Small, Nelson, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell; NAYS-None. Motion carried.

Board discussed amending the 2018-2019 budget, to create a new Disaster Fund to track the expenses and receipts incurred due to the flooding disaster. Present is SuAnn Engel, budget preparer. It is expected that the County will receive funds from FEMA and NEMA for repairs from the flooding. In order to be able to pay for the expenses prior to receiving funds from FEMA and/or NEMA, the 2018-2019 county budget will need to be amended. Money will need to be transferred from other budget funds into the new Disaster Fund for expenses being paid prior to receipt of any federal/state funds. Engel went through the current budget to find all available funds.

RESOLUTION #19-3

WHEREAS, Nance County Chairman has declared a state of emergency on behalf of Nance County due to the 2019 Flooding Disaster, and

WHEREAS, Nance County expects to receive Federal and State funds related to the 2019 Flooding Disaster and Nance County expects to pay out expenses related to the 2019 Flooding Disaster, and

WHEREAS, Nance County would like to separate the funds expended and receipted for the 2019 Flood Disaster and establish a Disaster Fund.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE NANCE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS that a Disaster Fund will be established into the 2018-2019 Nance County budget for the purpose of paying expenses and receipting funds related to the 2019 Flooding Disaster. Denise Ziemba, Emergency Manager, came before the board with updates on the flooding. She informs the board that the disaster emergency that President Trump declared, which includes Nance County only covers debris removal and emergency protective measures. Section C-G, including county roads, bridges, utilities has not yet been approved. With the damages along highway 39, and the damage to the bridge south of Belgrade, the county is well above their threshold of \$14,000.00. FEMA (Federal Emergency) and NEMA (State Emergency) are coming to meet with Ziemba today to look at damages and work on the individual assessments. Ziemba has had emergency managers from Keith, Hamilton & Nuckolls counties come help with paperwork. They have been a big help. She reported on the damages to Boone and Merrick counties. Loup Power's goal is to reopen the headgates. They have sand bagged on the South side. Should finish today. They will shut the gates, throw additional dirt on the sandbags to reinforce and fix all the bridges. Ziemba also informed the board that she has seen on Facebook about a Small Business Administration out there which is hired under the State of Nebraska that is telling individuals to register with FEMA for individual assistance. This is not valid unless Nance County qualifies. Individual Nance County residents are urged to contact Ziemba to fill out a damage assessment to help the county qualify for the federal help. Once Nance County qualifies, the individuals will work directly with FEMA.

Notice of the meeting was given to the Board and a receipt of their acknowledgment is on file in the Clerk's office.

Chairman amends the agenda adding Jim Kuntz to discuss the usage of Vacation/Comp/Sick during mandatory work schedule. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Small to approve the agenda as amended. Roll Call: AYES-Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke, Small, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT-Nelson. Motion carried.

Moved by Small and seconded by Voichoskie to approve the minutes of the March 26, 2019 meeting. Roll Call: AYES-Small, Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Cornwell; NAYS-Jarecke; ABSENT-Nelson. Motion carried.

Jim Kuntz is present to discuss pay claims/work hours. With the mandatory 12-hour work days for the road department, they are being required to use up to 8 hours of available vacation & comp hours, or sick if the time off pertains to an illness, if they need to take a day off. Kuntz feels that if they have put in their 40 hours, they shouldn't be required to take off vacation/comp or sick if needing time off. Cornwell explained that with the hours being mandatory, employees have to be accountable and requiring employees to use the vacation/comp & sick time accomplishes this. In addition, when a vacation, comp or sick time is used, the county continues to pay all time above 40 hours at time and one-half.

Moved by Ditter and seconded by Voichoskie to open the budget hearing. Roll Call: Ditter, Voichoskie, Horacek, Jarecke, Small, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT-Nelson. Present are SuAnn Engel, budget preparer, and Kurt Pickrel and Gary Northrup with the 1st Bank & Trust. Points West Community Bank and Genoa Community Bank were unable to be present. Darren Nelson and Rod Wetovick, County Attorney, arrive during the discussion. The board discussed the amendment of \$3.3 million to cover disaster expenses in the 2018-2019 budget and discussed bonding and loans available to pay disaster fund expenses until FEMA and NEMA funds are received. Currently the county has funds available for today's pay claims and for anticipated claims to be paid at the April 23rd meeting. Pickrel informed the board that there is only so much a bank can loan one entity. For example that amount for 1st Bank & Trust is 3 million dollars. A bond is a good avenue. If it can be structured so you only pay interest for 2-3 years then when the FEMA/NEMA money comes in, pay off the bond. Interest rates on bonds have come down since December. Pickrel will get with the other two banks in the county and get back with the board. Also discussed the option of a line of credit if the bonds cannot be issued prior to bills being paid. Board asked Engel to contact Phil Lorenzen with DA Davidson and set up a special meeting as soon as possible.

Request was made to National Guard, but the request was denied—Jarecke asked if the road department could try and get one north/south completely passable so residents south of the river can get south. S300th Ave. or S310th Ave. were suggested as they have the lease amount of damaged road surface. The road department will work on the request—Board asked Bernt of his suggestion for S290th Ave. north of 555th St. Bernt feels it would be best if the county just took over the road. Discussion held—It is reported that Wes Wahlgren with the NDOR has projected a Nov. 1st completion date for the bridge on Hwy 39 south of Genoa. Nelson talked to him regarding access for the rescue squad prior to the completion. Wahlgren said he was hesitant to put in a shoefly but he would contact Lincoln. It was suggested that the rescue squad use the tower road, so Nelson asked if the State would help with the maintenance on that road. They will check into that also—Cornwell informed the board that the agreement on the rental equipment (compaction roller and dozer) established a purchase price, so if the cost of the rental is close or above the cost to purchase, the county will purchase the equipment.

Pickrel returns with information on bonding. He called DA Davidson and spoke with Cody Wickham. Said that DA Davidson has been working with NACO last week on a process. He said the board could call him and he could explain it. It is short term money for the county until FEMA money comes in. Then once FEMA money comes in, you pay it back and the county can re-bond what is left. It sounds exactly what the county would be looking for. Cornwell asked Engel to make a call to Cody and set up a meeting.

He will need the county to sign a privacy release. It was asked why so little available to individuals. There are dozens of residents that have had basement damage, but don't qualify because they did not have a foot of water on the main floor of the home. Reimers gave Denise Ziemba, Emergency Manager, contact information for Michael in the Grand Island office. He can help her with this. Voichoskie asked why farmers are required to wait so long until they can do anything to their farm ground that has been damaged. He has contacted the FSA/NRCS and he is told that he cannot do anything to clean up his land until June. Reimers felt there are some inconsistencies with the agencies. He will send a privacy release for Voichoskie and start the casework process on this.



Board reviewed treasurer's pledged collateral – On April 3, 2019 new pledged collateral #80381LAA2 in the amount of \$100,000.00. Steve Pritchard, Extension educator, and Ashley Boryca, office manager, introduced Brad Schick as the new Beef Educator in Nance County. He covers 7 counties. He has a meeting this Thursday from 5-7 pm at the extension office for ag producers. Mr. Schick is originally from the Battle Creek area. They updated the board on all the donations made and donations still coming in for flood victims. There will be additional hay bales and also fencing supplies and labor to help replace fences. Fifty people have contacted the extension office for fencing supplies.

Engel has contacted Cody Wickham with DA Davidson and he can come up for a meeting next Wednesday at 10:00 a.m., if that works for the board. Engel states that there would be no upfront cost to the county for up to 3 years. If things get started by next Wednesday, they could wire us the money on the 24th of May and it would be available by our May 28th meeting. The final details are being worked out and should be available in the next couple of days. They are still lobbying for a 90/10 split for the FEMA money, making the county's share 5%. The clerk's office will post notices of the special meeting in Fullerton, Genoa & Belgrade.

The new surveillance cameras discussed at a November meeting could also be budgeted for in this line item.

Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney present.

Highway Superintendent, Tony Bernt, gave updates in the road department—four emergency route projects have been sent through. Updates on those four projects were given by Bernt. There are a total of 15 emergency route projects—hauling dirt over by Genoa—scrapers are running over by Brandon Bittners—Dept. is no longer working on Saturdays. A few employees continue to work five 12-hour days. Remaining employees are working the normal 9-hour summer schedule—County has found a new gravel pit south of Central City that they are able to get gravel from—equipment is holding up good through the flood work. There have been some small repairs, but nothing major. Will need to do something with the John Deere motor grader as it continues to use a lot of oil—Dept. continues to work on roads south of the river. Two main roads are



S290th and S300th Ave. are being maintained. Not putting a lot of rock or gravel on soft roads as it will just be lost through road use.

Paulson's will need to use N395th Ave. to get their equipment to the project to build shoe fly, so they are willing to help finish our project on N395th Ave. from Denny Mohr's place all the way to the highway at no cost to the County—Department is having a hard time completing projects with the rain that has been falling—Steensnes closed off 560th St. between 310th and 320th due to water running over the road—He received quotes for a new machine to replace the 2007 John Deere motor grader, which has 14,000 hours and is using a gallon of oil each week. Motor overhaul costs \$15,000.00. New cost of a CAT motor grader is \$316,590.00 and a John Deere is \$278,000.00. Trade-in is estimated at \$35,000-\$50,000. Steensnes points out that a new machine would have a warranty, prices are only going to go up, and with an overhaul you are still going to have a machine with 14,000 hours. Board will look further into this during the budget process—Discussed roads south of the Loup River. The department has dumped many loads of rock & gravel on the roads and the materials just disappear into the roads. Jarecke would like to get the road maintaining back to a normalcy. Some roads south of the river are only being maintained once a month. If the department will haul out the rock, Voichoskie offered to use his equipment to push rock into the holes as the trucks are having a hard time driving through the bad areas.

SuAnn Engel, budget preparer, passed out copies of the Disaster Fund budget for 2019-2020. Discussed the bonding process and what payments will be made in the upcoming budget year. There will be two bond interest payments that will come due in the 2019-2020 budget. Tax money for the interest payments may not all come in before the interest is due. Board agreed that the interest payments for this budget year should be doubled to be sure enough tax money is collected to make the interest payment. The board would also like the road department to put together and present some sort of a plan as to the repairs to the damaged roads when the budgets are reviewed. Discussed the need for the extension office to get some fund raising going to help pay for the new fairgrounds building.

A signed lease for the fairgrounds property was received by the Fullerton City Council. In January, Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney, had sent an email to the Fullerton City Attorney, Darren Wright, asking for a few changes to the lease. The lease was signed without the requested changes. Wetovick has concerns with the following: The lease states that the county will not sublet the lease. The board had asked Wetovick at the last meeting to draw up a sublet agreement with the Ag Society. Another concern is the agreement states that the county has priority of the grounds during the fair only. But the county has plans to use the fair building throughout the year and will need access for parking, so he felt that paragraph should be deleted. The agreement also states that if there is no fair held for a couple of years that the lease will expire. Again, the county plans on using the building throughout the year for many years to come, so the lease will be necessary even if the fair is not held for a couple of years. The board asked Wetovick to make those changes to the lease agreement and the revised agreement will be taken back to the mayor and city council. Horacek reports that Collins is waiting on a survey and they he will start on the water line installation.

Denny Johnson, Boone County Sheriff, comes before the board to update them on the dispatcher consolidation. Also present is John Buck, chief deputy, and Mary Hemmingsen, office manager. Everything is now in place to make the switchover. Boone County requested and were approved to use available 2914 funds for the upgrades. For the merger, Boone County has purchased a CAD system, upgraded their GEO Comm system to include Nance County, replaced a lot of hardware for the mapping, added 4 recording logs for 9-1-1 calls and updated the GEO Comm addressing. Total cost of the upgrades is \$108,000.00. With the consolidation there will be no delays in the calls. Radios are in place, sirens have been tested and a test page was issued. Everything is in place to switch over planned for Friday, May 31, 2019. In the event that Boone County dispatch center is wiped out due to a disaster, such as a tornado, they will be able to roll over all calls to Nance County and if Nance County likewise is wiped out, Platte County would be next in line to roll over to.

Tony Steensnes, road foreman, gave updates in the road department. VanKirk called re: N395th Ave. said Paulson's are coming to do asphalt on the highway soon, weather permitting. Paulson's will need to use N395th Ave. to get their equipment to the project to build shoe fly, so they are willing to help finish our project on N395th Ave. from Denny Mohr's place all the way to the highway at no cost to the County—Department is having a hard time completing projects with the rain that has been falling—Steensnes closed off 560th St. between 310th and 320th due to water running over the road—He received quotes for a new machine to replace the 2007 John Deere motor grader, which has 14,000 hours and is using a gallon of oil each week. Motor overhaul costs \$15,000.00. New cost of a CAT motor grader is \$316,590.00 and a John Deere is \$278,000.00. Trade-in is estimated at \$35,000-\$50,000. Steensnes points out that a new machine would have a warranty, prices are only going to go up, and with an overhaul you are still going to have a machine with 14,000 hours. Board will look further into this during the budget process—Discussed roads south of the Loup River. The department has dumped many loads of rock & gravel on the roads and the materials just disappear into the roads. Jarecke would like to get the road maintaining back to a normalcy. Some roads south of the river are only being maintained once a month. If the department will haul out the rock, Voichoskie offered to use his equipment to push rock into the holes as the trucks are having a hard time driving through the bad areas.

SuAnn Engel, budget preparer, passed out copies of the Disaster Fund budget for 2019-2020. Discussed the bonding process and what payments will be made in the upcoming budget year. There will be two bond interest payments that will come due in the 2019-2020 budget. Tax money for the interest payments may not all come in before the interest is due. Board agreed that the interest payments for this budget year should be doubled to be sure enough tax money is collected to make the interest payment. The board would also like the road department to put together and present some sort of a plan as to the repairs to the damaged roads when the budgets are reviewed. Discussed the need for the extension office to get some fund raising going to help pay for the new fairgrounds building.

A signed lease for the fairgrounds property was received by the Fullerton City Council. In January, Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney, had sent an email to the Fullerton City Attorney, Darren Wright, asking for a few changes to the lease. The lease was signed without the requested changes. Wetovick has concerns with the following: The lease states that the county will not sublet the lease. The board had asked Wetovick at the last meeting to draw up a sublet agreement with the Ag Society. Another concern is the agreement states that the county has priority of the grounds during the fair only. But the county has plans to use the fair building throughout the year and will need access for parking, so he felt that paragraph should be deleted. The agreement also states that if there is no fair held for a couple of years that the lease will expire. Again, the county plans on using the building throughout the year for many years to come, so the lease will be necessary even if the fair is not held for a couple of years. The board asked Wetovick to make those changes to the lease agreement and the revised agreement will be taken back to the mayor and city council. Horacek reports that Collins is waiting on a survey and they he will start on the water line installation.

Denny Johnson, Boone County Sheriff, comes before the board to update them on the dispatcher consolidation. Also present is John Buck, chief deputy, and Mary Hemmingsen, office manager. Everything is now in place to make the switchover. Boone County requested and were approved to use available 2914 funds for the upgrades. For the merger, Boone County has purchased a CAD system, upgraded their GEO Comm system to include Nance County, replaced a lot of hardware for the mapping, added 4 recording logs for 9-1-1 calls and updated the GEO Comm addressing. Total cost of the upgrades is \$108,000.00. With the consolidation there will be no delays in the calls. Radios are in place, sirens have been tested and a test page was issued. Everything is in place to switch over planned for Friday, May 31, 2019. In the event that Boone County dispatch center is wiped out due to a disaster, such as a tornado, they will be able to roll over all calls to Nance County and if Nance County likewise is wiped out, Platte County would be next in line to roll over to.

Don Shuda, Nance County Veteran's Service Officer (VSO), comes before the board to discuss the veteran service officer's budget for 2019-2020. Also present are veteran service committee members, Chuck Delancey, Dillon Busch, Stan Czarnick and Don Pearson. The committee members approved a \$208.00 increase in the VSO budget. The board will consider the increase when working with the budget. Shuda informed the board that the VA helped veterans after the flood with payments in an amount of \$10,024.42. In 2018 veterans received a total of \$1,122,000.00 in benefits. The Veteran's home in Grand Island was also discussed.

9:45 am Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney present.

Emil Rosno, committee member for the Nance Trans, comes before the board with an update on the Nance Trans boardings and trips. From July 1, 2018-April 30, 2019 they had 1,468 boardings driving 32,790 miles. He said the board meets this evening and will be hiring the office manager for the Nance Trans.

Cindy Russell, road secretary, submitted updated township road maintenance contracts for the chairman to sign. Board approved.

Highway Superintendent, Tony Bernt, gave updates in the road department—Speece Lewis has been helping with FEMA/NEMA paperwork. Cornwell voiced his concern that the county has not heard anything from FEMA on the flood. Speece Lewis is also looking to this—Bids for a new pickup were discussed. The department has two older pickups that are in dire need of replacing. Board approved the purchase of one pickup as long as money is in the road budget. When the sheriff's department purchases new vehicles, in the next budget, the road department will also take one of those pickups—Discussion on dissolving townships. Townships are having a hard time keeping up with the cost of road maintenance, and many townships are not active. Board asked Wetovick to look into dissolving townships.

Kendra Lutz and Jodanne McNeff did not show up for meeting.

Board reviewed the NIRMA billing statement for liability, damage claims, workers' comp. Alternate deductible levels were provided. Discussion held. In January, 2018 the county switched their internet connection from Hamilton Telecommunications to Applied. Applied had been leasing tower space for their equipment for a fee of \$600.00 per year. In lieu of the \$600.00 payment, Applied would supply the internet connection to the county at no cost. The new lease will reflect that change. Also Applied has equipment in the sheriff's department, which they may need access to after courthouse hours. Bakewell does not have a problem with them leaving the equipment in the sheriff's office. If access is needed after hours, they will need to contact sheriff or deputies. Changes will be made to the lease agreement and will be discussed again at the next meeting.

Ashley Boryca, extension office manager, came before the board to discuss the blood mobile holding their drives in the new events building on the fairgrounds. Also present is Marilyn Sonderup with the blood mobile. The blood mobile holds drives 6 times a year. They have no money to pay rental fees. They had contacted the Nance County Foundation to see about making a \$50 donation each time the blood drive is held at the events building. The county would need to waive the insurance fee. Board had no objections. She also stated that the foundation continues to receive donations and asked if they would be willing to give donations towards the landscaping. Zach Wegner did not see a problem with it, but would check with the board. Voichoskie asked if the FFA or 4-H kids could help with the landscaping. That would be an option also. Boryca states that she has had a lot of inquires on renting the building. Small asked if there were any fencing supplies left. All fencing supplies have been distributed. Wetovick came back with information on the county road unit system. He said if a petition signed by 10% of all qualified electors in the county to adopt a county road unit system is filed with the clerk, the board shall adopt the provisions of the county road unit system by resolution at the next regular meeting of the board. If there is any opposition to the county road system, they can file a petition signed by 10% of all qualified electors with the county clerk protesting the adoption. In that event, the board of county supervisors shall submit the question of a county road unit system to the electors of said county. Can also change from township to commissioners and could still be at large.

Key Road bridges in early November – Project by Kildays has not started yet, but plan to start soon – Tony Steensnes has resigned from the department and his last day is September 20th. They have received 10-11 applications so far from the ad that ran in the papers last week – Railroad will be coming to clean the debris from the railroad bridge east of the Co-op.

Tony Bernt, highway superintendent, gave road updates. Also present is Scott Russell, road foreman. Bernt informs the board that Ed Hoevet submitted a bid of \$56,475.00 to repair the bridge on N 500th St., north of Richard Hellbusch residence. Hoevet will be finishing up a big project next spring, so he will not be able to do the repairs until late spring-early summer 2020. There is an option to go with a FEMA mitigation plan to add a jump span to the bridge. As with the other flood damage, FEMA would pay for 75% of the jump span, giving the county a lot of improvement for a fraction of the cost. The county will be required to let for bids, if going with the FEMA mitigation, but if Hoevet cannot start until late spring-early summer, it may not be much of a delay, if any, to go ahead with the mitigation. The board will wait on paperwork from Speece Lewis and make a decision on how to proceed. They expect \$2,000.00 from client fees, leaving a balance required of \$45,231.00. There are 10 entities included in the program: 3 counties and 6 schools. McNeff had three options for payment of the \$45,231.00 and also 3 options for payment of \$85,519.00, in the event the enhancement grant is not awarded. Discussion held. The township has already fixed one road and have received a bid of \$100,000.00 to fix another road. With the damage to the dike, the ground surrounding the Loup Power District's property will more than likely continue to be damaged if any additional flooding were to happen. This would potentially do more damage to county roads already damaged from this year's flooding. The Loup had promised that they were going to fix the dike, but the Shotkoski's found out only 2 weeks ago that Loup's plans have changed and they are no longer going to fix the dike. Shotkoski has come to the board looking for input and support as they endeavor to get Loup to repair the dike. Ziemba had talked to Dan Hellbusch with Loup and she was told that the Loup was denied funds by the Federal Emergency Regulations Commission (FERC). They still want to fix it, but have no funds. One reason given for denying funds was that the dike had been abandoned one year after it was built as the dike was not being used for the purpose that it was built.
