Chlopek reports that Brandon Harter 1 vote for Fullerton Township and he has agreed to take the position. Others receiving votes Mike Vetick and Ken Rieken declined position. Since there are two vacancies, the board will need to fill those vacancies. Harter suggested the two current members on the township board be appointed. Chlopek contacted the previous board members and Craig Frenzen and Chris Cunningham both agreed to remain on the township board. Karen Prososki received 2 votes for East Newman Township and she has agreed to take the position. Others receiving votes that declined, Ken Boryca, Mary Yrkoski, Ed Syslo. Since there are two vacancies, the board will need to fill those vacancies. Prososki suggested, current member Brad Dudek, Zach Bialas, or either of the current members. Chlopek contacted Brad Dudek and he accepted he would remain on board, call placed to Zach Bialas at which he declined, call then place to Adam Ziemba and he accepted that he would remain on the board. Moved by Juracek and seconded by Voichoskie to appoint Craig Frenzen and Chris Cunningham to the Fullerton Township Board and Brad Dudek and Adam Ziemba to the East Newman Township Board.

Dan Cornwell, with planning and zoning with discussion on appoints for Planning and Zoning board. Lynn Belitz and Pat Connelly are up for reappoint and want to remain on the commission. Brett Houtby is up for appoint and he has declined as he has been on the commission for 20+ years. We would like to acknowledge our appreciation for Brett's 20+ years of service to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Discussion was had to a suggestion for a appoint for the vacancy, Horacek suggested Larry Cunningham. Dan will call him and report at the next board meeting. Dan Cornwell discussion on appoints for the Board of Adjustments. Natalie Sharman is up for reappoint and she has stated she will remain on the Board of Adjustments. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Crouse to reappoint Sharman to the Board of Adjustments.

Chlopek presented updates to the General Assistance manual for discussion. The manual must be updated every 2 years. The update includes a new figure for income resource guidelines, based on 75% of the Poverty Guidelines updated in the Federal Register by DHHS. This raised the figure from \$798 to \$849 for a one-person household; from \$1078 to \$1144 for a two-person related household; and an additional \$295 for each additional related household member. Figures for maximum payments per month allowed for shelter were figured @ 8.6% inflation increase and raised the figures from \$543 to \$590 for a 1-person household; from \$598 to \$650 for a 2-person household; from \$653 to \$710 for a 3-person household and \$706 to \$767 for a 4 or more-person household. Non-food necessities were also figured with an 8.6% inflation increase. Board approved the increases for income/resource and shelter allowance. The board will approve the updated manual at the January 24th meeting.

Board reviewed newly pledged collateral #3140LBWB5 in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 and #3130APPD1 in the amount of \$1,000,000.00. Moved by Ditter and seconded by Nelson that said pledged collateral was reviewed.

9:10 A.M., Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney.

Dan Cornwell, presented the Rural Health Match as past Economic Development Director as he started this process before the transition to the Clerk's Office. Brittany Bertram present via Zoom. D. Cornwell reviewed background of DHHS Rural Health Match Program. When she first approached NCDA Director with the Rural Health Match. He explained that if needing a match that she would need to approach the county where she works, Platte County. She did and came back and stated that Platte County does not have an economic development or agencies to facilitate program. She then came back to NCDA for assistance. She had talked with her employer and they agreed to match \$5,000.00 for 3 years. There was discussion with DHHS about the program and not working in the county they are applying for match and they agreed that with this situation that as long as 1 entity was a facilitator that it would be fine. She has received 3-year agreement of \$2,500.00 each year from Fullerton Economic Development and Nance County Foundation. She has received 1 year agreement of \$2,500.00 from the Nance County Development Agency. D. Cornwell on behalf of Brittany, stated that she is appreciates the work of the NCDA Director to facilitate the program for her, currently there is no mental health practice in Nance County to work out of, she can not start her own business until working under a practice for at least a

year. She works for Columbus Community Hospital who is her current employer, serves surrounding counties. In the future might be seeing patients in Genoa at the Genoa Community Hospital. Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Nelson to approve giving Brittany Bertram a rural health match of \$2,500.00 each year for three years, funding from the Inheritance Fund.

Albin Ziemba, Easement for waterline under road. Road on 350th Ave, between SE1/4 Section 19-Township16-Range 4 and SW ¼ Section 20-Township 16-Range 4. South of previous easement from Albin Ziemba earlier this year. Moved by Juracek and seconded by Voichoskie to approve Easement for Albin Ziemba for a waterline under the road.

Sarah Ciancio, representing herself and her husband and Mike McCray came before the board to discuss what can be done with the road N 230th Road to their new house. It is a mail and bus route. She has talked with township and they state they do not have the budget to bring the road to standard. T. Cornwell stated that the county would take it over once the road is built to standard. It is currently a minimum maintenance road. The county could be hired to do the work and cost looking at \$3,000.00 to \$3,500.00 to bring road to standards, this would be from the highway to the driveway of the house. County attorney, stated that he would like it to go thru the township and township would need to agree for the road to be brought to standard and then taken over by county. Explained there would need to be an agreement from township and someone from the township would need to be present at the board of supervisors when the road is relinquished to county and there would need to be an agreement of who is going to pay for the work to bring the road up to standards. Sarah stated she would meet with the township and get back with the board.

Shirley Stuart-Monroe, Clerk Magistrate on update on upgrade of equipment in courtroom (audio-visual components, equipment or full systems). The only cost to the county will be having Applied Connective Technology run new lines and if there is possible electrical work to be done. Applied Connective has been here and ran the lines. The county will be provided with a Memorandum of Understanding outlining the agreement for the AOCP (Administrative Office of the Courts and Probation) to hand over ownership of audio/visual systems once installation is complete to the county. Each courtroom is covered by both manufacturer warranties and a 5-year agreement for support through CTI. After installation and confirmation of working order, the AOCP will transfer ownership of all equipment to the county by Statement of Acceptance which shall include a complete inventory listing. There is no payment of funds required to complete transfer of ownership. County attorney wanted to clarify that after 5 years that the county will need to budget for repair and maintenance. Moved by Juracek and seconded by Crouse to approve county to sign the Memorandum of Understanding once all installation has been completed.

Tony Bernt, Highway superintendent, gives department updates. Project on 160th Ave is about a month-month and a half from completion. Update on projects out west that Tom Glenn had brought to the board March 2023. Tom Glenn was going to do the work on 485th and he has not started the work yet. The other 4 projects (on 465th, 470th) Bernt said possible once work is done on 160th that they will do those, since they are out that way already. Update on the road building roof, contractor said it should be within this month, as they are still waiting on supplies, once work complete then we should be able to work on getting our FEMA excess funds money. We are still down 2

motor graders and in Norfolk at CAT, #9 motor grader motor supposed to be in this week and then when a bay is open, they will start work and #14 motor grader repair is under complete warranty and work has started. Sany is looking getting one of their motor graders here for our drivers to demo. Discussion on FEMA/ NEMA money. Bernt stated they have said final payment will not be given until all work is done. We are waiting on the county roads, the management costs, and excess funds to be paid out. Bernt is looking into why we were only paid 75% and not 90% of the Hellbusch bridge project. Emergency Manager, Jenna Clark stated that she has contact information at NEMA that could be contacted to see where the process is. management cost grant for the 5% of our portion, Jenna Clark, Emergency Manager stated that all documents have been turned in by her and Cindy at the road department. The drive pump for the wheeled excavator is out, waiting on quote from CAT for repair, will have to trailer it back into town. Culvert projects are on hold until excavator repaired. Did not get selected for this round of County Bridge Matching program. The bridge on the Valley Road we were looking at if we were selected in this round of Bridge Match, and since not selected, that bridge is a strong candidate for culverts to replace bridge. Will not getting the matching funds of \$250,000.00 from Timbercreek Bridge until we close the road to the old bridge after new road on 160th is completed. There are 2 fully funded upcoming bridges, Swantek Bridge is looking at starting the beginning of next year and the Homolka Bridge in 2027. The bridge on the Valley Road we were looking at if we were selected in this round of Bridge Match, and since not selected, that bridge is a strong candidate for culverts to replace. Cornwell asked if there were any other bridges that needed addressed, Bridge by Andy Johnson, Bernt stated that could be replaced with culvert, Nissen Bridge west of Genoa needs looked into for ideas.

SuAnn Engel, HR/ Budget presented how the preliminary budget is looking. She presented pie chart to show where tax dollars are being spent by each fund function. Presented a list of expenses by department and requested budget. Asked for each department to look at ways to decrease budget request if able. We do not have the fund balances yet, which could make a difference. Discussion had on the Local Assistance Tribal Consistency Fund of \$100,000.00 and how we should look at spending it. Discussion had and reviewed that the \$100,000.00 could be spent on the purchase of the 2 new sheriff's vehicles, making the bidding process and reporting easier. Talked about property tax relief. Discussion had on what we have done in the past years for transfer from Inheritance Fund to give property tax relief, decided to at least start looking at a \$300,000.00 transfer this year depending on how the budget numbers look.

Moved by Nelson and seconded by Crouse. Roll call: Ayes- Voichoskie, Horacek, Nelson, Crouse, Ditter, Cornwell; Nays- None; Absent- Juracek; Abstain- None. Motion carried.

Discussion had on Agreement to Alter Street Approach in the front of the courthouse. Agreement states: The City agrees to allow the County to install and build a suitable drain and cover said drain to allow individuals to access the sidewalk approach to the Courthouse without the hazards of ice, snow or excess water. County agrees to install said structure, at the cost of the County, and hold the City harmless from any and all liability that may result from its installation and use. County agrees to maintain said structure and clear the immediate area of ice and snow as necessary to make the installation function properly. In the even that the proposed installation does not achieve the desired result of better safety, the County agrees to remove it and place the approach back to its current condition. Discussion was had on ideas for structure, some ideas were a pipe and cement or a wire grate that is moveable, will look into what will work the best and better for snow removal and still allowing water flow. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Nelson to approve signing the Agreement to Alter Street Approach between the County and the City. Roll call vote: AYES- Horacek, Nelson, Crouse, Ditter, Cornwell; NAYS-None; Abstain-Voichoskie; Absent- Juracek. Motion carried.

Discussion on donations from Counties to entities. It was brought to the attention in another county in Nebraska from the state auditor stating that counties can not make donations of public funds. According to the Nebraska Supreme Court, a county's authority is limited to the powers granted to that political subdivision by statute: It is well settled in this state that counties have no inherent power, and that their commissioners, or agents, acting for them, have only such powers, generally, as are especially granted to them by statute, or such as are incidentally necessary to carry into effect those which are granted. Donations have been given to Museums, Libraries, and Nance Trans, those have statues associated with them, we will require receipts of what the money was spent on. Question on DHHS loan repayment program was had, it was discussed that DHHS Loan repayment should just come from Economic Development (NCDA) and not from the Board of Supervisors from the Inheritance fund also. Economic Development only granted 1 year of the loan reprogram and Nance County Board of Supervisors committed to 3 years. For next year recommended that the Board continues with their 3-year commitment but that the NCDA does not approve the next 2 years, as then county participating in Loan repayment as 1 entity. From here on out, on future applications, discussed that all funding goes thru NCDA and not thru the Board of Supervisors using Inheritance Fund. Will put on agenda for next meeting, for further discussion.

The County Board will need to designate a vendor for the 2023 postcard printing. NACO will coordinate with the State Print Shop to help facilitate the postcard process. County Assessor explained that we used the State Print Shop last year and it worked well. Moved by Nelson and seconded by Voichoskie to designate the State Print Shop as Nance County's vendor for 2023 postcard printing.

Landon Knopik with the Nance County Sheriff approached the Board of Supervisors about the barrier for the mountain lion. Knopik submitted a drawing of what the barrier will look like when finished. It will need 8-foot posts, conduit pipes, plexi glass, wood for the base and other supplies needed to build. Received quotes from Cedar Valley Lumber and Home Depot.

After discussion, decided to use local, Cedar Valley Lumber for supplies. The only thing that he can not get at Cedar Valley is the conduit pipes.

Tony Bernt, Highway Superintendent gave updates on the road department. Project on 160th continues, will work with Sheriff Dept. to fly drone over when project is finished. Have some dirt to still move and tubes and driveway culverts to put in. Roof work started last week, removing rock/rubber roof and starting framing. Will be worker longer hours in the coming days to get work going on the roof. Sharples Heating and Air is trying to work with county to see where the best place to put the air conditioner unit, it currently is on the roof, but with the new metal slanted roof, recommended moving it to side of building on west side for easier cleaning. Have a solid bid for the roof project and will need to take out of inheritance fund and pay back when FEMA/NEMA money received for project. # 14 motor grader back from getting warranty repairs, when taking it off the trailer, the front differential was catching on something, CAT is sending someone out to look at. The #9 motor grader is at CAT currently getting engine put in. Excavator has a hydraulic drive pump that went out. Roughly \$8,000.00 to fix. CAT came down and fixed last Monday.

Bernt, brought in the Township Agreements. Current agreements are \$715 for regular roads and \$385 for minimum maintenance roads per mile. For snow they only do regular roads, except if people have cows, etc. down minimum maintenance roads. Currently county has as agreement for Prairie Creek Township where they maintain their own roads. We are on the 3rd year of a 5-year agreement, they charge the county monthly. Discussion on what the charge is per mile for Prairie Creek to maintain their own roads. Discussion on how many miles that we maintain and what that looks like for the county. Would like to look into what other counties with townships are charging. Would like to look into pricing, and then be able to decide on if there is a change needed. Moved by Nelson to approve Township Agreements as they stand, same as last year and seconded by Voichoskie, discussion had on what county is bringing in per mile for maintaining road and look into what other counties are charging, and what Prairie Creek figures out to with what they charge the county for maintaining the roads. Would like it to be looked at before they decided if the price should change. Discussion on what we spend compared to what we make. Will look at things for next year, as these are redone each year. Roll call vote: AYES-Horacek, Nelson, Crouse, Cornwell; Nays- Ditter; Abstain- Voichoskie; Absent- Juracek. Motion carried.

Discussion on Audit of Retirement. Main question is Temporary/Seasonal Employees. Need to look at the process of temporary employees vs part time employees. Temp. employees need to be rehired for next season. Part Time they would receive part time benefits. Would like to be put on the next agenda for discussion with the budget to discuss about making them part time and adding benefits.

Discussion on spraying River, unsure if the grant funding will continue. Cornwell will talk with Weed Superintendent about funding and spraying of river. Spraying will be done only if grants are available.

Discussion from Megan Zoucha, Assessor and Chlopek, Clerk on protest hearing date and time. Currently have 9 protests but have till Friday June 30th to bring in protests. Discussed having them during the morning of July 11th at the next meeting, Board willing to start earlier in the morning, depending on how many protests are to be heard.

SuAnn Engel, Budget/HR had budget discussions. She handed out the budget binders to all the board members to review before next meeting, July 11th at which each department head will meet with Board to discuss budget. There is a possibility of needing the pink postcard again this year, the tax request increase limit for not needing a postcard is \$72,000.00 in total asking. Engel was able to get budget to pass validation for now but waiting for end of year revenue amounts and beginning fund balances. At this time the unrestricted funds are low at about \$84,000.00. We are using \$50,000 in capital improvements and \$608,000.00 in interlocal agreements to help pass validation. Discussion had on road building remodel, would budget

\$50,000.00 in building fund, with the difference coming from Inheritance Fund. She increased Road Dept. cash reserve from \$70,000.00 to \$100,000.00 and increased the general fund \$40,000.00 to assist with cash flow. We used 94% of last year's tax asking budgets. Preliminary budgets are starting to be brought back in by townships, fire districts and Ag Society. Ag Society has brought theirs in and has a Capital improvement asking of \$21,700.00, the board has requested that a representative from the Ag Society to come before the board about the preliminary levy allocation. Chlopek, will get ahold of the president of the Ag Society and set up a time for the Board meeting on July 25th, 2023.

He stated that he has 15 trees that he feels have been sprayed, some as old as 40 years and 40 feet tall, Autumn Blazed Maple and others. He has contacted the NRD and the NE forest service and they are coming Friday July 14th to look at the trees and make report. Depending on what is suggested he might have samples taken to see what would have caused it. He then stated that he is then going to contact the Nebraska Department of Agriculture to report the over spray. Tony Bernt, Highway Superintendent and Chad Borowiak, weed superintendent discussed that Sandhills Management will have records of when the river was sprayed and the helicopter that sprayed. Schweitz explained that the board members were welcome to go down and look at the area. Once testing is done, will have to work with Sandhills Management to compare. Will revisit once testing has been done and more information has been gotten.

Dan Cornwell, Zoning Administrator gave an update on the Comprehensive Plan. It has gone thru the first draft. It has gone from 109 to 106 pages. It has been

reformatted and restructured to be easier to read. They have begun to review/update of the current zoning regulations and there are a few items they are considering changes as they continue to work on the Compressive plan. They will have a first draft review meeting and then after feedback is considered and updated will schedule a Public Hearing for consensus building to solicit public feedback in September or October. Will bring more updates as this process continues.

Board of Supervisors met with all department heads to discuss their budget proposals and other agenda items, as follows.

Tony Bernt, Highway superintendent, gives department updates. Project on 160th Ave they are working on finishing work. The road department building roof project is continuing, they are starting framing but still have rock that needs taken off. The 2-week estimate is going to take longer. There was some bad weather around Genoa last night and they are working on fixing some roads, etc. Discussion had on Macon Rd closure, will not start process until 160th project is open. Discussion had on budget proposal for Road Dept. Changes that were made or suggested: Noxious Weed Budget removed getting a new pickup from this budget. Discussion on Supplies-Chemicals line item, making sure that items are purchased in the current budget, not rolled to the next. Road Budget: Increase in wages, \$1.00 raise due to change in comp. time, another \$1.00 raise depending on evaluation and then another 3% raise this year. Discussion had on moving temporary employees to part times employees and increase the line item to cover the addition to the retirement that they would receive. Increase to the general liability line item by \$2,500 to \$42,500. Increase in Road Equipment parts and labor. Increase in Machine hire by others, for work out North west. Erosion line item has had an increase of \$10,000 due to the 160th project. Machinery fuel discussed and have an increase of \$70,000. Traffic sign line-item increase of \$5,000, due to the problem of signs being stolen. Discussed a public notice for assistance from the public. For the concern of the public safety and the budget for sign purchasing. Line item for equipment rental and truck rent has had a decrease. The right-of-way has increase of \$30,000, looking at fixing corner on bottom road to Belgrade. New machinery increases of \$50,000, due to purchase of scrapper and tractor. Looking at around \$390,000 increase from last year. Sinking bridge keeping \$100,000 in fund. Highway buyback is what we expect to bring in at \$229,833.15.

Ronda Malander, Treasurer in to discuss budget proposals. Looking at an increase of total budget, mainly due to wage and insurance increase. Trying to save on postage, due not send receipts to people for taxes. Increased travel expense to \$500 as Treasurers are required to have continuing education. Have left the money in the line item for furniture, will look at something new for better functionality.

Megan Zoucha, Assessor in to discuss budget proposals. Increase in wage and insurance. Have line item for hiring appraiser, have been doing more internally with residential and might need to hire appraiser for commercial this year. Lowered the maintenance/repair line item, as las year scanned all cards to make digital and that is done. Increase of travel, mileage, dues, regs. as they are required to have continuing education. Data processing equipment increased to \$1,200 in case there would be a computer issue.

SuAnn Engel, HR/Budget/Building to discuss budget proposals. HR increase due to wage and insurance. Building Fund discussion on remodel for road department office,

it is going to be a few years project. Building is a structural sound and just looking at option to start the remodel project. The capital outlay building fund decided to decrease the budget to \$30,000.00. Building and Ground Fund Looking at lowering event center electricity and raising water/garbage due to not sure how many time the garbage would need to be dumped at event center. Increase cleaning service, as the company is saying there will be an increase come January. Sinking building and lawn added \$5,000. County Surveyor budget is staying the same.

Engel to report for Steve Pritchard, Extension office budget proposal. Increase due to wages and insurance incentive.

Shirley Stuart-Monroe, County and District Court budget proposal. Increase in District Court for the inter-local agreement. No changes in county court or district judge fund.

Dan Cornwell, Zoning administrator budget proposal. Line item for comp. planning will need to be \$7,500 due to finishing the update of the Comprehensive Plan. Increase in wage to be comparable to other zoning directors. It is a part time job at around 16 hours a week, after plan is updated that could lower. Has 10 permits already this year last year 13 total. Looking at 12-16 hours a week.

Rodney Wetovick, County Attorney budget proposal. Increase wages and insurance but eliminated the part time clerical salary. Increase in rental equipment due to now renting a copier from Eakes.

Ben Bakewell, Sheriff budget proposal. Down 2 deputies, going to go a year without replacing one. Stated his staff is doing fine and they have hired a new one to start this year. Safety equipment increased due to payments on tasers and body cameras. Discussion on deputy salary line item. Bakewell purposes to raise salaries across the board of all deputies to \$34.50/hr. Discussion on leaving 1 deputy out of the budget this year, if we would need them and not have the budget, Bakewell states they will be fine and it can be revisited next year if needed, would like to train one new deputy at a time. Communication Fund had an increase with the agreement with the Communication center with Boone County. County Jail has a slight increase, concern with that one is an unknow with costs that could occur. Left some money the Sinking Sheriff Fund. Change in contracts with cities, made Genoa inline with Fullerton, Genoa will see a decrease of \$7,000. Contract covers 51% of the budget. Discussion on wages will continue to raise, compared to others in areas due to the shortage of staffing. With the contracts being 3 years, need to keep in mind the increases of insurance each year.

Jenna Clark, Emergency Manager budget proposal. Increase in wages and insurance with yearly increases but also due to marriage next year. Travel and lodging increase due to training in November in California. This will be reimbursed by Homeland Security Grant through East Central PET Region after training. Kept the budget for office equipment as will be needing a new laptop. Increase in workshops due to trainings needed. Adding a new line item for equipment rental for a copier. Sinking Emergency Mgt. fund was voted by advisory board to transfer excess funds from last fiscal year to this fund. Discussed with Board about training opportunity in Grand Island in August, for Local Elected and Appointed Officials about roles and responsibilities that officials play in a disaster and supporting emergency incident management. Clark, recommended that officials attend that it is a good half day conference.

Adrian Chlopek, Clerk budget proposal. Increase in wages and change in insurance due to hiring new employee. Supervisor fund- increase due to wages and insurance. Increased dues/subscrip. and travel due to board members attending trainings. Clerk- Increase in wages and change in insurance due to new employee needing health insurance. Taking insurance incentive to \$0.00 as it will not be needed. Increased dues/subscrip. and lodging due to attending more trainings. Election Commissioner- Increase in part time election workers wages due to increase in minimum wage. Increase in office supplies due to needing to purchase a new back up battery for the county machine for election. Did decrease dues and subscrib., last year it was higher due to not having the money the year before. Veteran's Service- Increase in wage. Miscellaneous General- Increase in liability insurance another \$2,000 to \$44,000. Change in photo copier maintenance lower due to moving leases to leased equipment line. Left publishing the same but expecting it to be lower due to the condensed minutes that are published in the newspaper. IT Maintenance has increased, we have a grant covering some but need to budget if we do not have the grant. Discussion on Nance County Transportation, they were not using and when called and asked they said they did not need the assistance at this time. Decided to take that line item to \$0.00 as they have not used it. County audit is a bit larger than what we spent last year, due to needing a single audit this year. VMP Flow through increase due to increase in cost. Economic Development- kept budget the same just took the difference in salary down to professional services. That can be used if needed for grant writers, etc and to still have the budget if something changes for staffing. Economic Development sinking fund transferred \$20,000 in excess funds from economic development fund.

Engel, discussed that the cash reserve for general and road was increased and that is reflected in our cash on hand. County valuation up \$51,000,000.00 from last year. Looking like asking for around \$270,000.00 more in taxes than last year. Levy last year was .296150, this year looking at .306386, about a 1 cent increase.

Dan Cornwell, Planning and Zoning Director gave updates on the Comprehensive Plan and Zoning regulations and final invoice. It has taken longer to complete and the consulting group working on Plan would like final payment. Dan informed them that final payment would be made when the final product is approved in November. The Planning and Zoning Commission meets on November 15th to approve the new plan. There are about 12 changes. It will then be brought to the Board of Supervisors on November 28th for approval and to be adopted. At that time the final invoice will be paid.

Jerad Reimers, Congressman Smith's District Coordinator presented updates from Congressman Adrian Smith's Office. Discussed that the Grand Island Office handles case work, which helps constituents and government entities to navigate federal red tape, from the IRS, VA Benefits, expedite passports, etc. Discussion on Congressman Smith being Chairman for subcommittee of trade. One of the main issues for Nebraska that he is addressing is Ag trade issues. Healthcare is also a concern of Congressman Adrian Smith and working on requiring insurance companies to be more flexible for rural coverage for traveling nurses and hospice. Question on the farm bill from County Attorney, stated it is with the budget bills (12 appropriations bill), which they will be back to once the Speaker of the House Race is decided.

9:45 am Ben Bakewell, County Sheriff Present.

Jenna Clark, Emergency Manager, presented her quarterly update. Management Performance grant to reimburse ½ salary and benefits is on track for this year. ARPA Grant for 50% reimbursement of office expenses, was able to turn in expenses to get full share for reimbursement, was able to use Alert Sense and damage assessment tool invoices. Have gotten a little over \$3,000 reimbursement from the ARPA Grant. In August, she participated in two exercises (tabletop and full scale) with Loup Power, Platte and Nance County, worked on evacuation, public notification, etc. Public meetings for MFO were held and applications turned in, should hear about them soon. Asked by chairman, if there was a way to have public meetings sooner, so it can be done before budget time. Jenna stated that would work to do them earlier. The Silver Jackets high water mark project is done, waiting on printing of sign. It will be a high-water mark at the Headgates from the flood, it will be a historical marker and public awareness on flooding. Loup Power will install the sign and the Army Corp. of Engineers will do an unveiling. She also participated in Homeland Security exercises/training. on how to put together training, either tabletop or full scale. Will have the ability to do more training locally. She also is the head of the State Training team for the region. Attend meetings at NEMA a few times a month, to help organize statewide trainings. The International Association of Emergency Managers is next week in California. This training is fully grant funded thru our region.

Tony Bernt, Highway Superintendent gave updates on the road department. 160th Ave project, road is open. After research, there was already a resolution (#22-17) to change N. 160th Ave from minimum maintenance to a local road in August of 2022. Not in a hurry to close bridge and Macon Road, want to work on removing gravel. Discussion on the process of vacating road, about a 2-month process and needs to start with a study from the highway superintendent about the road usage. The tree shredder is working again, still having some issues with overheating, getting parts to fix. Chad Borowiack, Weed Superintendent, has been using the new mist sprayer to spray areas that they have shredded, to help with regrowth. Can shred trees between September 1st and April 1st without having to have a bird study done. Will be working on bridge cleaning, there are 39 bridges to clean before Thanksgiving. Will be cleaning the decks before they are inspected. Would like to look into construction air

compressor at sometime to help with the cleaning of the bridges. Tom Glenn 485th project, they are working on rocking today and finish work. If we do projects like this again with them, Tony would like to work with them on the way he would like to see projects finished. Did have them add a few culverts during the project. Discussion held on Township Round Table meeting being scheduled for December 12th, 2023 and at that meeting discussing graveling and maintenance of minimum maintenance roads. Discussion held on a quote received from Applied Connective for security cameras on the outside of the road buildings. The quote is roughly \$5,000 a building. There are also internet concerns at the buildings, right now have Pep waves, enough internet to run timecards but not to run cameras. Would need to look into adding different internet at the buildings to run cameras through Verizon. Will put on agenda for next meeting, November 14th for discussion of cameras. Road department is having 2 retire this year, Tony will look into a date for a retirement party for them.

SuAnn Engel, HR/ Budget presented updates with the budget. We have received the \$200,000 bridge match for the Belgrade Southwest Bridge. Bridge was paid for with those matching funds program, \$458,000 from buyback program, \$493,000 from inheritance, and \$410,000 from tax asking. On track for budget transfers of \$218,000 every other month, road salaries are roughly \$110,000 a month, road bills monthly need to be \$100,000. Inheritance tax is right about \$1.2 million after the \$400,000 tax relief transfer. Owe roughly \$9,000 to pay on the road roof project. Then if we get FEMA money, inheritance tax would be repaid \$338,000 to inheritance to reimburse roof project. There was also \$242,000 from General from a bridge payment and interest payments that could be paid back from FEMA money. Discussed increasing cash reserve whenever we can in the budget, SuAnn joined in a National meeting, and learned that in other states they can spend their cash reserves, in Nebraska we can use cash reserves to help with cash flow but unable to spend it. Need to be looking at ways to adjust and increase our cash reserve when we can. Disaster funds: we are earning interest, would like to use the interest for some tax relief and to make the interest payment on the bond in December. When working on the budget, for August through October we estimated getting \$9,500 a month in interest, have received more than that each month. For November through January cut it in half due to not knowing the interest rates. If things continue on the same track, we should be able to use \$75,000 for tax relief and \$23,000 for the bond interest payment. If we get any excess FEMA funds, we should consider putting that into our sinking funds, not necessarily used for tax relief. She attended the NIRMA Self-Defense Conference last week in Kearney. While there she received a dividend check for \$4,354 for Nance County. conference is education on protecting the county and improving culture. She stated that it was a fitting conference for her HR position to attend. Discussion held that there was a lot of incorrect information while policies were being adopted but the changes that were adopted have been discussed for a long time. She wanted to assure the board she is not aware of misuse of the time clocks or PTO use. Explained that any changes to employees times are done in writing, whether on pink slips, clipboard, or email. She attends the NIRMA HR Roundtable once a month, they have HR Specialists that discuss things from work comp., FMLA, culture, discrimination, etc. It is a great asset to her that is offered free with our insurance and she will continue to use. Discussed that she has been approached by NIRMA and many about her position as HR/ Budget, it has been becoming a more popular position, especially with in-house budget preparers and constant changes with budgets and HR. She discussed there are many new laws and regulations that are favored more to employees and not employers. It is a balance to have enforcement of policies but create a favorable culture to be able to work. Talked about how she learned that 79% of employees have burnout throughout the year, we need to be encouraging our staff to take their breaks and utilize PTO to help with burnout and to be thankful for good employees. MIPS had come in, to job shadow payroll, to watch how we process payroll and to see how they could make the new program better and useable. Discussion held on employee appreciation and encouragement of things that can make employees more productive and happier with their job.

The Board reviewed and approved the County Treasurer's Miscellaneous Receipts #23090033 through #23090085 in the amount of \$405,819.10 for the month of October 2023.

9:26 am, Moved by Crouse and seconded by Juracek to open public hearing for the review of the updated Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Regulations. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Juracek, Nelson, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried. Dan Cornwell, Zoning Administrator, along with Keith Carl and Tim Keelan from Hanna: Keelan Associates, P.C. presented the updated comprehensive plan. D. Cornwell reviewed the title pages and the 6 sections of the comprehensive plan. Explained that though this is a 10-year plan, it can be amended as we move forward or if decided that this is not having a positive result, it can be changed. Discussion held on population, stated the population is stable and the goal is the preservation of agriculture, yet encouragement of residential development while preserving existing housing stock. During the discussion on Section 4, there was a discussion on the Future Land Use Map. The state highways were reviewed to determine the potential impact of rural development adjacent to those corridors. Currently the density is 1 residence for every 40 acres. With the proposed plan it would be changed to 1 residence for every 20 acres along state highways. The proposed change also includes a 1 mile on each side of state highways for potential development. It was suggested by Wetovick, County Attorney to move the 1 mile to ½ mile as of concern for access. Discussion held on non-agricultural residences, needing conditional use permits and will be discussed in the zoning regulations. D. Nelson brought up a concern about how this would affect the County's Livestock friendly status, having non-ag residences being under the conditional use section for zoning would keep this is line while also preserving agriculture. Wetovick, brought up defining Ag business and non-ag vs ag residential better in the plans. Public presents were John, Andrew and Susan Nelson, Jason Melcher, Marc Mahoney, and Tim Konz. Melcher voiced concerns of the impact of allowing housing outside of city limits. Melcher talked of being progressive without any negative effects. He had concerns about nuisance complaints from individuals if an agricultural producer could be grandfathered in to continue use without complaints if residential were to move near producer. He stated that if we are considered livestock friendly but having residential move out to rural area, would it infringe on rural agriculture, do we want to allow residential properties to come in and infringe on the taxes from agriculture or do we want residential to come take over the agriculture sector. He also questioned if doing this would have a negative impact on cities, need to choose where to make residential areas where it would have a positive effect. Keelan addressed stating making nonag residences a conditional use would help to avoid any negative effects. Keith Carl reminded that the future land use map, just noted the favorable areas throughout the county. J. Nelson asked about house wells being a certain distance from irrigation well. Keelan explained that is regulated by other agencies, but something could be added to the initiatives section of the Comprehensive plan. Recommendation was stated to work with the cities with comprehensive plan and zoning, so that the whole county is on the same page. D. Cornwell presented the updated Zoning Regulations. He went over the changes that the planning and zoning

committee proposed to change: 1.) Change the "Future Land Use Map" and "desired development areas" to 1 mile on each side of the State Highways t/o the County except for south of highway 22 from Fullerton to Genoa and west of highway 39 from Genoa to County Line (due to floodplain concern) and also change/increase density from 1 resident every 40 acres to every 20 acres along all State Highways:. 2.) Change setbacks from 83 feet to 63 feet (33 feet from center of road and 30 feet from property line. 3.) Add zoning regulations for Solar Energy Conversion Systems. 4.) Change the "Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality" (DEQ) to the new proper name of "Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy" (NDEE. 5.) Add the following definitions: Barndominium, also referred to as "Shop House (Shouse)," shall mean a combination of a dwelling unit and machine shed under a common or connect roofing system. For purposes of a Barndominium, these structures when on a farm, agricultural operation, or acreage shall not be classified as a farm building. In addition, the residence portion of the facility shall meet the definition of "Dwelling.". 6.) Add definitions for Personal vs. Real property: "Personal" property shall mean movable property and anything subject to current or transfer of ownership except land (e.g. pivot points, cattle bunks, movable greenhouses/temporary buildings, etc.). "Real" property shall mean a parcel of land and all that is immovable and permanently attached to the land to where the owner has all rights of ownership to possess, sell, lease and use the land or property. 7.) Add clearer language of when a certified survey is required for lot splits and change of boundaries. 8.) Clarify the Fullerton and Genoa Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) definition, location, responsibilities, and zoning requirements (first right of refusal, ultimate responsibility, etc., et following language (The lot shall be in a square or rectangular shaped three (3) acre tract) in the AGR Zoning District that was previously amended/deleted in the AG Zoning District. 10:37am, Moved by Horacek and seconded by Nelson to close public hearing of the review of the updated comprehensive plan and zoning regulations. Resolutions will be approved and signed once changes requested at this meeting are made. Moved by Juracek and seconded by Horacek to approve the comprehensive plan with the following changes: Change from 1 mile along the corridor to ½ mile and add that non-agricultural residences will be required to have a conditional use permit. Discussion held, Voichoskie on house and irrigation wells being to close if water table is low, discussed that is a NRD regulation but would be addressed with the conditional use permit. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Juracek, Cornwell; NAYS-Nelson; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried.

Moved by Ditter and seconded by Voichoskie to approve updated zoning regulations. Discussion held. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Juracek, Nelson, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried.

D. Cornwell discussed the rezoning of 29 acres in the SW ¼ Section 28-Township18-Range 4 along Highway 39. JoAnn Thomazin is the landowner, along with her son John Thomazin applying for the change of zoning. Would like it rezoned from Agriculture (AG) to Agriculture-Residential (AGR). They are proposing to split the 29 acres into 2-acre residential lots. In the subdivision regulations, the minimum would be 3 acres if private sewage and water used. This is the first of many steps in the process, this would come before the board of supervisors 2 more times as a draft request to change the plat and a final request to change the final plat. Moved by Horacek to approve to rezone from ag to ag-residential. Horacek then rescinded the motion. John Thomazin stated that the subdivision is conceptual at this time, there is concerns with drainage and slopes on the south boundary that he will have to address. J. Thomazin stated that each residence would have private septic and domestic water. At 10:59 am, moved by Juracek and seconded by Voichoskie to open public hearing on the rezoning of 29 acres from ag to ag-residential. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse,

Juracek, Nelson, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried. Landowners within 1000 feet and the school district were sent letters of the public hearings on the rezoning of the land. During the public hearing of the Planning and Zoning Committee there were concerns of drainage and general ag concerns. Voichoskie questioned if this is approved, would there be a chance for expansion, J. Thomazin stated that there is no other room for expansion. At the planning and zoning committee meeting, it was recommended for approval by the committee to be brought in front of the Board of Supervisors. J. Nelson asked how this would affect his manure hauling. Explained that it only affects the stock piling of manure. He noted he was worried about unintended consequences. J. Nelson wanted to make note that the support for this project was coming from zoom from Florida. Concerns were discussed for hog and cattle producers in the area, if residential was allowed. J. Melcher noted he would like to make sure everyone is protected, including the agricultural sector and his concern of future annexing. Discussion held on potential of changing stock piling animal waste from platted residential area, currently 1 mile with potential to change to ½ mile. J. Melcher noted that there is a difference between born and raised agricultural and born and raised city, he noted there will be complaints when city comes out to agriculture, would like everyone to remember the taxes received from the agriculture sector. Moved by Juracek and seconded by Horacek to close public hearing on the rezoning of 29 acres from ag to ag-residential. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Juracek, Nelson, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried. Horacek reinstated his previous motion and seconded by Juracek to approve rezoning stated above. Roll call vote: AYES-Voichoskie, Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Juracek, Cornwell; NAYS- Nelson; ABSENT- None. ABSTAIN: None. Motion carried.

D. Cornwell, Zoning Administrator presented Lot Split Application for Lane and Justine Knopik. Splitting off 5.22 acres from the SW ¼ of Section 33- Township 17- Range 7 from land currently owned by Kathy Dolan. Discussion held. Moved by Horacek and seconded by Crouse to approve said lot split application.

Tony Bernt, Highway Superintendent gave updates on the road department. Bid letting for Genoa West Bridge bid letting date set for December 14th, 2023. NDOT will take care of rerouting traffic and closure of road. All the grass has been sowed from the recent projects. There is a retirement party today for 3 road employees, Scott Russell, Duane Goelz, and Jim Borgheiinck. Scott Russell addressed the board and thanked the board for all the support and appreciated all his years that he has been with the county. Looking into a double walled fuel barrel for on-road diesel, did get a quote from Sapp Bros. for one (1000 gal around \$5640 and pump \$1400). Will put it on the next agenda for discussion. The land around the west shed, that the landowner was concerned about the trucks driving on. County Agreed to purchase about ½ acre, for the purchase of \$5,000. A continuous fence will be placed on 2 sides (south and east), county will purchase panels and landowner will purchase posts. The landowner will put posts in, would like a locate done and to get posts in before ground freezes. County will make landowner a driveway on the south side of county property. County will put up panels. County Attorney will get deed drawn up for purchase of ground.

Prairie Creek Township Road Maintenance Agreement discussed. This agreement will go from January 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024. Prairie Creek Township will grade the roads in Prairie Creek Township for Nance County. There are approximately 47 miles of road to be graded. In return, Nance County will pay Prairie Creek Township \$30,000.00: in twelve monthly payments in the amount of \$2,500.00, first payment being made in January 2024. Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Horacek to approve and sign Road Maintenance Agreement. The full agreement can be viewed in the Clerk's Office during normal business hours.

The agreement between the Administrative Office of the Courts and Probation and Nance County, Nebraska was reviewed and discussed. Agreement for the parties wish to set forth an agreement wherein the Clerk Magistrate as Clerk of the County Court for County shall be the Ex Officio Clerk of the District Court for County. The county shall reimburse AOCP for 50% of 40 hours per week at the rate of the salary of the Assistant Clerk Senior during the time of the contract. Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Nelson to approve and sign the agreement. The full agreement can be viewed in the Clerk's Office during normal business hours.

RESOLUTION #23-36

A RESOLUTION TO ADOPT

THE UPDATED AND AMENDED NANCE COUNTY ZONING REGULATIONS – NOVEMBER 2023

WHEREAS the duly appointed Planning and Zoning Commission of Nance County, Nebraska held a public hearing on November 15, 2023 with proper notice given and has recommended through majority vote the adoption of the updated and amended Nance County Zoning Regulations; and

WHEREAS the County Board of Supervisors had given public notice as required by Nebraska State Statutes of a public hearing to be held on November 28, 2023 in the Nance County Courthouse on the proposed updated and amended Zoning Regulations; and

WHEREAS the public hearing was held pursuant to said notice and all statements received at the hearing were duly considered by the County Board of Supervisors;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Nance County, Nebraska that the Nance County Zoning Regulations have been updated and amended as follows:

1. Changed the "Future Land Use Map" and "desired development areas" (as noted in the 2033 Comprehensive Plan) to 1/2 mile on each side of the State Highways t/o the County except for south of highway 22 from Fullerton to Genoa and west of highway 39 from Genoa to County Line (due to floodplain concern) and also change/increase density from 1 resident every 40 acres to every 20 acres along all State Highways:

- Pages 16 and 20: After the following sentence: Minimum Lot Area and Density:
 A. Single family dwellings, including mobile homes Three (3) acres excluding road R.O.W. and at a density of no more than four (4) residences per U.S. Government surveyed quarter section. Added the following sentence: However, within ½ mile along all State Highways, the density can be increased to no more than eight (8) residences per U.S. Government surveyed quarter section at a minimum of twenty (20) acres per residential development. (amended November 2023)
- 2. Changed setbacks from 83 feet to 63 feet (33 feet from center of road and 30 feet from property line):
 - Pages 17, 21, 25, 27, 31, and on the last page (Summary of District Regulations): Minimum required front, side and rear yard setbacks for all uses or structures shall be no less than eighty-three (83) sixty-three (63) feet from the center of the road when such yards are contiguous to a county road or State Highway. (amended March 2009 and November 2023)
- 3. Added zoning regulations for Solar Energy Conversion Systems:
 - Pages 55 through 58: Article 19 Solar Energy Conversion Systems (added November 2023)
- 4. Changed the "Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality" (DEQ) to the new proper name of "Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy" (NDEE):
 - Pages 8, 24, 27, 31 and 40: Changed the name of Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy (NDEE). (amended November 2023)
- 5. Added the Barndominium definitions:
 - Page 67: Barndominium, also referred to as "Shop House (Shouse)," shall mean a
 combination of a dwelling unit and machine shed under a common or connect roofing
 system. For purposes of a Barndominium, these structures when on a farm,
 agricultural operation, or acreage shall not be classified as a farm building. In
 addition, the residence portion of the facility shall meet the definition of "Dwelling."
 (amended November 2023)
- 6. Added Dwelling (non-agriculture-residential) and Dwelling, farmstead (agricultural-residential):
 - Page 70: Dwelling (non-agricultural-residential) shall mean a building or a portion thereof that provides living facilities for one or more families, but not including hotels, motels, boarding or lodging houses and shall include manufactured dwellings located on a tract of land not less than three (3) acres, has been lawfully occupied within the last twelve (12) month period as a single family residence, and is not necessary or

- incidental to the normal conduct of a farm or agricultural operation, or generating less than \$1,000 annual income on agricultural-related crops and product.
- Dwelling, farmstead (agricultural-residential) shall mean a building or a portion thereof that provides living facilities for one or more families, but not including hotels, motels, boarding or lodging houses and shall include manufactured dwellings located on a tract of land not less than three (3) acres, has been lawfully occupied within the last twelve (12) month period as a single family residence, and is necessary or incidental to the normal conduct of a farm or agricultural operation, or generating \$1,000 or more in annual income on agricultural-related crops and product.

7. Added definitions for Personal vs. Real property:

- Page 79: "Personal" property shall mean movable property and anything subject to current or transfer of ownership except land (e.g. pivot points, cattle bunks, movable greenhouses/temporary buildings, etc.). (amended November 2023)
- Page 80: "Real" property shall mean a parcel of land and all that is immovable and permanently attached to the land to where the owner has all rights of ownership to possess, sell, lease and use the land or property. (amended November 2023)
- 8. Added clearer language of when a certified survey is required for lot splits and change of boundaries:
 - Page 34: After the following sentence: No lot, lots, tracts, or parcels of land shall be split nor subdivided which would create a nonconforming lot or tract in the district in which it is located. A minimum of three (3) acres, excluding road Right-Of-Way, is required for future lot splits in all zoning districts. Added the following sentence: A survey from a certified surveyor is required for each lot split/change of boundary. (amended November 2023)
- 9. Clarified the Fullerton and Genoa Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) definition, location, responsibilities, and zoning requirements (first right of refusal, ultimate responsibility, etc., etc.):
 - Page 72: After the following sentence: Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) shall mean the area beyond the corporate limits, in which a city or village has been granted the powers by the state to exercise zoning and building regulations and is exercising such powers. Added the following sentence: ETJ boundaries are determined by the respective City or Village and are illustrated in each City or Village's Comprehensive Plan and/or Zoning Regulations, or on the Nance County GIS website. (amended November 2023)
- 10. Delete the following language (The lot shall be in a square or rectangular shaped three (3) acre tract) in the AGR Zoning District that was previously amended/deleted in the AG Zoning District:

• Page 24: ARTICLE 14: AGR AGRICULTURAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, Section 5. LOT REQUIREMENTS AND INTENSITIY OF USE: After the following sentence: The minimum lot requirements shall be as follows: 5.1 Minimum Lot Area and Density: A. Single family dwellings, including mobile homes – Two (2) acres excluding road R.O.W., except as herein exempted or on non [1] conforming lots of record. Lots less than three (3) Acres must also obtain a sewer permit review from the Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy (NDEE). The following sentence was deleted: (1) The lot shall be in a square or rectangular shaped three (3) acre tract. (amended November 2023)

11. Added the following language under Section 3. Permitted Conditional Uses, regarding Single Family Non-Agriculture Residential Dwellings:

- Section 3. PERMITTED CONDITIONAL USES: A building or premises may be used for the following purposes in the AGR Agricultural Residential District if a conditional permit for such use has been obtained in accordance with Article 8 of these regulations:
 - 3.17 Single family non-agricultural residential dwellings, including mobile homes, on an improved road, meaning a road above county minimum maintenance road classification or a public street within an approved subdivision; in addition, single family dwellings must be located minimum distances from a livestock feeding operation in conformance with Article 17 Section 19, when not of the same property and with Sanitary Requirements of Article 17 Section 11 of these Regulations.

Moved by Horacek and seconded by Crouse to approve said resolution. Roll call vote: AYES-Ditter, Horacek, Crouse, Voichoskie, Nelson, Cornwell; NAYS-None; ABSENT-Juracek. Motion carried.

D. Cornwell, Zoning Administrator presented Lot Split Application for Donald and Janelle Carlson. Splitting 4.89 acres more or less from SE ¼ of the SW ¼ of 12-17-5. Discussion held. Moved by Voichoskie and seconded by Nelson to approve said lot split application.

SuAnn Engel, HR/Budget presented a 6-month Budget Review for fiscal year 2023-2024. She presented the Board with a 6-month expenditure report and a summarized version to review. The Survey budget, HRA deductible buy-down line item, and the gravel line item were concerns. Engel talked about increasing cash reserve when we can to help with cash flow.

Moved by Horacek and seconded by Ditter to adjourn.
